Affairs in the Sandwich Islands—Slaking of the Spores of Hawaii—Earthquakes Occurring—A Diplomatic Announcement.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25.—Honolulu advices to September 5 confirm the report of the sinking of the southeastern shore of Hawaii. The same occurrence was observed at Port Hilo. The subsidence at Hawaii in some places is from three to four feet, and in others from six to seven feet; while at Hilo the greatest subsidence noticed was only eight inches.
