DEUT. 1. 28; ix, 1 .- What will those persons who object to "illustratine" the Bible, or explaining its figures and metaphors, say to such passages as these? - On July 26, at Gower Street Chapel, Mr. Philpot took for his text Jer xxxii, 14; and in introducing his subject said, "Before I enter into the spiritual part of my subject, it will be necessary to explain the his torical and literal; for without knowing the literal meaning of a passage, it is impossible rightly to understand the spiritual." This is precisely our view, and what we have for a long time been aiming at; and how beautiful hundreds of figurative expressions in the Bible appear when we know their meaning! What are the passages at the head of this paragraph but figurative? To us they may seem extravagant; but they were not so to the Israelites. Indeed, not only the Israelites, but the Greeks at a later period, were in the habit of using similar expressions; not with any idea of deceiving, but simply to set forth now very high the walls were: just as, in Genesis xiii, 16, and xxii, 17, and Numbers xxiii, 10, the descendants of Jacob are compared to dust, to show how numerous they would be.
