Naturalizations in the Supreme Court Sept. 29.

The "Professional" Vouchers Have Taken Fright and Disappeared.

We present below the names of 407 persons of foreign birth who were naturalized in the Supreme Court on Tuesday, the 29th of September. In nearly every case the residence of both the applicant and voucher was found on the petition, but in some instances the direct and positive order of the Court that this should be required was disregarded, and there is no clue by which these men can be discovered until they present themselves at the polls.

The Professional Vouchers have almost entirely disappeared, having been alarmed by the proceedings taken by us about this time for disclosing their doings. James A. Watson, however, was not to be intimidated until placed under arrest on the charge of perjury, and he is consequently appearing on the 29th of September 14 times, making a total thus far detected of 67. THE LATEST NEWS.

Gen. Dyer Believed During his Trial—American Board of Foreign Missions—Affairs in Spain.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Special Dispatch to the Evening Telegraph. Returns of the Attorney-General, Washington, Oct. 7.—Attorney General Evarts returned last night, and resumed his duties to-day.

General Dyer Relieved. Secretary Schofield has relieved General Dyer, Chief of Ordnance Bureau, from duty during the session of the Court of Inquiry in his case.

Revenue Appointments. Charles Farwell was today appointed storekeeper of the First District and Joseph Butcher storekeeper of the Second District of Pennsylvania.

From Connecticut. Norwich, Conn., Oct. 7.—The first session of the American Board of Foreign Missions opened to-day. The Rev. S. B. Treat, of Boston, made an appeal in support of missions, reciting what had been done, etc.

William E. Dodge made an address, and concluded by moving that Mr. Treat's appeal be referred to a committee, and that the subject be open for discussion. S. B. Chittenden, of New York, also made an address. After some other speeches, Judge William Strong, of Philadelphia, chairman of the committee appointed last year on disabled missionaries and missionary children, read a report reviewing what had been done under the rule of 1855. He reported against a home to be supported by the Board, and against the entire support of children of missionaries. He also reported against a seminary devoted to the reception and education of missionary children, and recommended adherence to the established rules of the Board, and that in view of the increased expense of living, the fixed appropriation for the support of children be substantially increased.

Members of the Supreme Circle of Brotherless of the Union, on a visit here, waited on the President this afternoon, and after keeping their dancing attendance upon him for a long time, while he was engaged with some domestic politicians, he received them in the East Room. An address to the President was made by F. P. Gibbs, of Philadelphia, to which Johnson replied in his original style, telling them he was a mechanic, and that he was the members generally are mechanics.
