TO THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA.

It will be your duty on the 13th instant to e'ect a President Judge of the District Court for the City and County of Philadelphia. The Hon. J I. CLARK HARE, who has been on that bench for nearly twenty years, is a candidate for re-election.

The principle seems now to be established in Philadelphia that the Judiciary must be tifted above mere party politics, and that when pure and capable Judges have acquired respect and experience by long services they shall not be subject to the ordinary chances of an election. In 1861 Judge Sharswood was nominated by both parties, and the District Court remained unchanged. The best men of both sides united in 1857 to re-elect Judge Ludlow, who had been ten years in office. Judge HARE, whose judicial services have continued for nearly twenty years, will receive, we are satisfied, a simi-

lar support. A frequent change of Judges is a public misfortune When these who have, by years of discipline and labor, reached a habit of judicial intercourse which tends to harmonize views and facilitate administration are lost to us, and new and untrained men take their places, evils and embarrassments arise which only those in our position can faily understand. We trust that such a result may not be reached in the

District Court. The undersigned, members of the Philadelphia Bar, unite in testifying to the eminent purity and ability of Judge Hare, and to his long and tried services on the Bench, and in asking earnestly that the principle so fully established in the cases just referred to shall not be forgotten at the coming election. Party conventions may insist upon presenting rival candidates, but conservative citizens of both sides will support tried and faithful judges.
