CITY INTELLIGENCE.

JEFFEESON MEDICAL COLLEGE. - The inaugural address of Dr. J. Aitken Meigs, on entering on his duties as Professor of the Institutes of Medi-cine and Medical Jurisprudedce in Jefferson Medical College, has been universally admired by the medical profession. The subject was the "Correlation of the Physical and Vital Forces," and, a ter paying a glowing tribute to the worth and merits of the late Professor Dunglison, the late incumbent of the chair, he gave an elaborate and learned statement of the recent progress of science relative to the correlation of the forces referred to in his subject, to which was due much of the physiological advancement in the me hods of research employed in chemis-

He referred to the labors of Dr. Metcalte, of Kentucky, and Gardner Vanoxem, one of the early members of the Academy of Natural Sciences, who were in advance of Protessors Grove, Carpenter, and other English writers in the enunciation of the correlation theory.

Naturalization Frauds.

The following letter from Judge Agnew explains itself, and will be read with interest on account of its application to current questions:— Beaven, Oct. 14, 1868.—My Dear Colonel:—I have received your reply of the 10th instant to my letter of the 8th. It, as you say, the practice relating to naturalization of aliens, which in mine I had disapproved as irregular, was "ap proved" by my two brothers lately holding the Nisi Prius, and if you acted under the "direction" of the Judge who held the Court, I have nothing more to say on that point. It would be improper, in a letter to a clerk, to comment on the rulings of a member of the Court. I can now only regret, if your statement be correct, the practice I had condemned is brought home so nearly to ourselves.

Waiving that, I am constrained to say that your explanation of the rush of naturalization papers through our court is not satisfactory. It is wholly immaterial whether the true average per paper be twenty-five or thirty-five seconds, this momentary period being wholly inadequate to any intelligible understanding and determination of the case. The petition must be opened and read, or its contents stated to the judge, If there be a previous declaration of intention, the certified copy from the record must be examined and the judge satisfied of its character. One oath is to be administered to the applicant and another to the witness, the jurats thus doubling the number of the petitions. The judge must then form his opinion in each case on the evidence of residence, moral character, and fit-ness of the applicant, his attachment to the principles of the Constitution, and right disposition to the good order and happiness of this

But, in order to dispose of the great number of cases run through so hurriedly, you inform me that five or more persons were engaged in the business, and that this would give three minutes of time to each case. That would do if it belonged to each subordinate or tipstave to decide, and he were qualified by learning and capacity to do so; but you forget, or omit to mention, that as the Court has but one judge and one prothonotary, a single person necessaand the picture and pass upon every case, and, therefore, each must be examined and determined in the twenty five or thirty-five seconds of time. You consequently either permitted the subordinates and tipstaves to decide upon the admission to citizenship, or suffered some of the cases to pass through without a determination.

As to your fees, it is a matter of no moment whether they were paid or secured by card, the circumstance having been mentioned as an element in the consumption of the brief period of time, and not as important in itself.

Of course I did not expect you would discuss with me the powers of the Court or its officers, but I reminded you that naturalization is a judicial question, because as a lawyer (and the Prothonotaries of the Supreme Court are chosen from the bar) you would know that the question is not an open one, it having been decided in Rump vs. Commonwealth, 6 Casey.
475, by our Court, the Bench then being composed of Lowry, C. J., and Justices Woodward,
Thompson, Strong, and Porter. It had long before been settled by the Supreme Court of the United States, in 4 Peters, 407. As a lawyer, I suppose you would readily comprehend what is implied in a judicial act, and thus perceive how far your practice had departed from the appro-priate character of a judgment of the Court, It s unnecessary to add more.
