# MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

The City Amnsements. AT THE CHESNUT the Hanlon Transflautic Combination will appear this evening. The troupe of acrobats and gymnasts is one of the best that has ever sppcared in this city. Plau, the Russian performer on the flying trapeze, executes a number of perilous feats with astonishing skill. James Blamphin, harpist; Miss Emily Thorne, comedienne and vocalist; Altred B. Sedgwick, concertist and buffo singer; and Messrs, Sylvani and Benedict, grotesque artists, will also appear.

AT THE ABCH Lotts will appear this evening. for the first time in Philadelphia, in Edmuni Falconer's play of the Firefly, which will be produced with new scenery, costumes, etc.

AT THE WALNUT Mr. E. L. Davenport will commence an engagement this evening, and will appear as "Hamlet." The tragedy will be presented with all the fine scenery, furniture, appointments, etc., which were prepared some years ago under the superintendence of Mr. Edwin Booth.

AT THE AMERICAN there will be an attractive miscellaneous entertainment.

THE GREMANIA ORCHESTEA will commence a series of performances at Horticultural Hall on Wednesday next, under the leadership of Mr. William G. Dietrich. The following programme will be presented: - Overture, Semuramide Ressini; Song, "Wiederschen," F. Diethe: cornet solo, to be performed by S. Dunn. Almack's Taenze "Waltz," Launer; Andante con moto, Fifth Sinfonie, Beethoven; Aria de Ballet, from Robert le Diable, Meyerbeer; Overture, Oberon, Weber; Cello solo, to be performed by R. Henning; selection from Don Sebastian, Donizetti.

CARL SENTZ'S ORCHESTRA MATINEE on Saturday afternoon, at Musical Fand Hall, drew together a crowded and elegant audience. The programme was brilliant and attractive in the extreme, and gave delight to everybody. On next Saturday Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony" will be presented for the first time in America.

#### Musical Items,

-In the French capital an interesting experiment is about to be made in the coming winter, in the way of operatic performances in the German language. They are to take place at the Opera Francais on the alternate nights, when French pieces are not represented. It is thought that the development of musical taste, and the curiosity excited by foreign musical compositions, afford some chance of success to the undertaking. The principal works of the German opera are to be given, particularly the productions of Richard Wagner. The artists will be selected from the best singers in Germany.

-The administration of the Royal Theatre of Berlin, after long negotiations with Mad'lle Nilsson, have at last succeeded in engaging this artist for two months from November, 1869. They had hoped that Hamlet would have been represented this year in the Prussian capital, but they have been obliged to make a virtue of necessity, and the rehearsals have consequently been adjourned. Independently of "Ophelia, Mad'lle Nilsson is engaged to sing the music of the "Queen of Night" in the Magic Flute.

-The Italian opera season in St. Petersburg will commence on November 4 and end on March 2. Pauline Lucea will appear before Christmas, and then Adelina Patti will commence an engagement of two months from January 1. Mario and Graziani have also been engaged.
