MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

E. I. Davenport at the Walnut. O'Keefe's bright old comedy of We'd Oa's loses much by being compressed into three acts, and we wish that Mr. Davenport and other actors of first-rate ability would make it a matter of conscience, as Mr. Murdoch does, to present this and other standard plays of like character as nearly entire as is consistent with decency. The leading actor shows to better advantage where the dialogue is not crippled by ruthless "outtings;" and very excellent as was Mr. Davenpori's ac ing last evening, there was an incompletences and want of finish about the performance, as a whole, which is attributable mainly to the cause we have indicates, for the actors generally acquitted the nselves creditably, and the comedy went off with spirit. Mr. Davenport's "Rover" is a fine exhibition of his powers as a comedian: it is less exuberant than Mr. Murdoch's, and less rollicking and extravagant than the readition of some other actors who have attempted it of late years-It more subdued, Mr. Davenport's is perhaps a finer rendition than any other, if we except Mr. Murdoch's, and we are not sure but that we like it, on the whole, better than that excellent comedian's personation. Mr. Davenport makes "Rover's" spoutings seem like his natural atterances, and his play-book quotations come as pat as if they were the coinings of his own brain. This is not a small merit, in our opinion; for the temptation to exaggerate is very great, and only a really refined and intellectual artist would be willing to forego his opportunities for exciting laughter and applause for the sake of making a real character out of what the dramatist, in all probability, only in. tended for a piece of laughable burlesque. Not the least merit of Mr. Davenport's delimestion is the delicacy and refinement with which he represents "Rover's" vagrant disposition and extravagances, restrained by his love for "Lady Amaranth," until he is transformed into a perfect gentleman in manuers and conversation, as he already is in heart and teeling. Indeed, the whole personation is one that it is a pleasure to witness for the present enjoyment that it gives, and to remember as one of the really good things that we meet with semi occasionally in the course of a play going experience.

In an entirely different vein from "Rover" is the "William" of the nautical drama of Black-oyed Susan, which was given as an afterpiece last evening. "William" has always been a tavorite part with Mr. Davenport, and one of the most popular with his audiences. All the strong points of the conventional stage sailor are brought out, but there is a real power and pathos about it which raise it to a high rank as a genuine work of art. We have never seen him act "William" better than he did last evening, and the appreciation of the audience was shown by the heartiness of the applause.
