A Child, Stolen Twenty-five Years Ago,

Thus matters rested until last Tuesday, when a Mrs. Martin, at the suggestion of a mutual friend, was introduced to and visited Mrs. Bowen. During the conversation that followed it became plain that they were sisters, and that Mrs. Martin was the mother of the Alabama lady who was stolen twenty-five years since. Thus the two met and were recognized after an absence of thirty years, with never a strawberry mark on the left arm of either. One sister has been a resident of Galveston fourteen years and the other eight. Both are happy in years and the other eight.
