tion in our courts, and have discovered strange doings there. According to their observations unnumbered shoals of fraudulently naturalized foreigners have already been metamorphosed into voters

In some instances the Tammany myrmidons have waylaid the passers-by at the City Hall, lugged in men and boys to the old Sheriff's office, and insisted on their names and addresses.

Papers were then filled up with their names as applicants, and those that refused their signatures were builted and intimmidated. and in one or two instances suffered personal violence and confinement. Be we men and suffer such dishonor?
