against a majority of 12,901 of all the registered voters. At the constitutional election held this year, 70,812 votes in favor of the new Constitution were cast and 1005 against it—less than half the whole number registered; but the reconstructed State was received into Congress.

ARKANSAS.

The vote of Arkansas in 1860 was for Douglas, 5272; for Breckinridge, 28,732; and for Bell 10,091. An election was held in 1866 for Auditor, Berry (Union) receiving 6178; Miller (Democrat) 15,241; and Fagan (Democrat) 12,690.

INDIANA.

The vote of Indiana, which votes for President only on November 3, in 1860 was for Lincoln, 120,633; for Douglas, 115,609; for Breckinridge, 12,266; and for Bell, 5306—a majority of 6223 for Lincoln over all. Since then the vote of the State has been as follows:

MISSOURI.

The vote of Missouri in 1860 was for Lincoln, 108,833; for Douglas, 34,872; for Breckinridge, 9593; and for Bell, 23,331. Since then the vote has been as follows:

KANSAS.

The first vote in Kansas was for State officers, in 1861, when there was no opposition to the Union ticket. The vote of the State has been as follows:

DELAWARE.

The vote of Delaware in 1860 was for Lincoln, 3515; for Douglas, 1023; for Breckinridge, 7357; and for Bell, 3531. Since then she has voted as follows:

FLORIDA.

The vote of Florida in 1860 was for Douglas, 307; for Breckinridge, 8513; and for Bell, 5137. In 1865 David S. Walker was elected Governor less than 4000. In 1867 there were 11,148 whites and 15,450 colored registered at a convention almost without opposition, being 912 more than a majority of the registered voters. At the election of this year the vote stood as follows:

GEORGIA.

The vote of Georgia in 1860 was for Douglas, 11,880; for Breckinridge, 51,885; and for Bell, 23,886. An election held in 1861, under the rebel regime, for Governor, resulted in 49,404 votes for Joseph E. Brown to 32,439 for E. A. Nisbet, the latter being the more ultra Rebel of the two. In 1865 Charles J. Jenkins was elected Governor without opposition, receiving 37,200 votes. In 1867 there were 95,202 whites and 95,373 colored registered—a total of 192,575. In 1868 the white majority of 288,746 against 292,923 over a majority of the registered voters. The following was the vote of the present year:

LOUISIANA.

The vote of Louisiana in 1860 was for Douglas, 7025; for Breckinridge, 22,801; and for Bell, 20,204. Elections for Congressmen in portions of the State were held during the war. The first election throughout the State after hostilities had ceased was in 1865, when 45,109 whites and 84,431 colored were registered—a total of 129,540, with a colored majority of 37,322. The vote for a convention resulted in 1867 in favor of the Union ticket, and the convention held last spring resulted as follows:

The vote of Mississippi in 1860 was for Lincoln, 62,811; for Douglas, 21,633; for Breckinridge, 6588; and for Bell, 2048. Since then the vote has been as follows:

SOUTH CAROLINA.

This State, previous to the rebellion, did not vote for Presidential elections, which were chosen by the Legislature. In 1865 James L. Orr was elected Governor, receiving 974 votes, while Wade Hampton received 19,077—a majority of 607 for Orr. The registry of 1867 embraced 97,010 whites and 98,296 colored—a total of 195,306.

TENNESSEE.

The vote of Tennessee in 1860 was for Lincoln, 23,016; for Douglas, 12,313; for Breckinridge, 11,400; and for Bell, 12,194. The following is the vote:
