Democracy in its Worst Form. Tan Democratio election officers of the Third and Fourth wards of this city, and their collongues, the unterrified crowds of desperate men who were gathered about the polling places in these sections of the city, made a determined effort to pervert the will of the people of the entire State into the endorsement of the Tanmany repudiation platform and the revolutionary schemes of Frank Blair. Remembering that the R-publican ticket had a majority in the State of nearly ten thousand, at the election held in Ostober, the game was a deeperate one, and required a desperate hand to play it successfully. Doubtless the recognized leaders of the party, the men of assumed respectability, who do not touch the dirty work with their own hands, but apportion it out among their reckless followers, and participate only in the spoils of office which it brings within their reach, were fully advised of the state of the law r-gulating the counting of the votes for Presidential electors, and fondly hoped that there could be found and applied no tangible remedy for the correction of the most outrageous frauds that might be committed under their instructions and through their connivance. In the proceedings before Judge Allison, in the Court of Common Pleas, yesterday, the lamentable fact was revealed that the election of the highest officer known to the law of the republic, the President of the United States, is at the mercy of unsorapulous men. If the election officers of a few precincts of the city of Philadelphia see fit to disregard their oaths, and to stuff the ballot-boxes with hundreds-even with thousands-of fraudulent votes, and to make a correspondingly fraudulent return thereof; unless the Board of Return Judges for the county, on whom devolves the ministerial duty of computing the totals of the returns made to and through them individually, will assume the responsibility of rejecting such fraudulent returns, the will of the people of the State, in a close election, may be entirely perverted, and the destinies of the nation changed.

The Return Judges adjourned for two hours, to give the advoca es of the fraud an opportenity to defend or explain, but they did not put in an appearance, either in person or by attorney; and their remissness in this respect must and will be taken as an acknowledgm-nt of the justice and legality of the action taken, both by the Return Judges and the Court of Common Pleas.

The happy result of this action by the Return Judges is a clear majorf y of 5812 for the Grant and Colfax electors in this city, which, we are fully persuaded, is not less than 5000 below the actual majority of the votes of those who were entitled, under the law, to the franchise. If the same principles are applied to the contested election cases which will come before the Court of Common Pleas on Saturday next, the lowest candidate on the Republican ticket will be found to have been elected by a handsome majority, even after giving to the Democratic candidates the benefit of the 6856 fraudulent votes which were cast for them on the strength of Mr. Snowden's tipstave certificates of na turalization.

DEFEATED BUT NOT DISMAYED .--- We see that the names of Seymour and Blair are still proudly and defiantly flung to the breeze at the Democratic headquarters, at Ninth and Arch streets. This shows pluck if not good sense, and there is nothing like keeping up a good heart under the most discouraging circumstances. Perhaps Mr. Chairman Wallace and his confróres intend thus early to indicate their preferences for the nominees of 1872, but we should have thought that the "unterrified" had had quite enough of Seymour and Blair by this time, and that they would be willing to allow them to retire into oblivion without making any uss about it. 

From these unquestionable figures it will be seen that the vote of the Tenth ward, which is constantly and rapidly increasing in population, has shown a constant and healthy inorease since 1860; while the Fourth ward, nearly stationary in point of population-a faot which is patent to every person who is acquainted with our city-starting in 1830 with a vote one sixth less than that of the Tenth ward, and so lagging behind the latter that at the election of 1866 its vote was still onefifth less, between the 13th of October and the 3d of November takes such rapid strides that its wote increases from 61 to 93 percent. of the whole number of taxables, regular and extra assessments included, the vote of the Tenth ward during the same period decreasing from 73 to 72 per cent. The full force of this inequality is more vividly disp'ayed by the comparative number of dwelling-houses in each ward, the Fourth showing one and one-third voters to sach house, while the Tenth has but fourfiths of a voter to each house.

The precise manuer in which this result was brought about was revealed by the affidavits which we published yesterday. These sworn statements disclosed such a glaring iniquity that Jadge Ailison, a man who stands above the suspicion of partisanship, was constrained to style it "a great and flagrant wrong, committed upon citizens who are entitled to deposit their honest ballots." In the face of these facts, the Return Judges, advised that there was no legal remedy save that which they themselves might take the respon-

THE reports from the Plains indicate that the Indians are beginning to realize that war with the United States is something more than a holiday struggle. If Peace Commissioners and the Indian Bureau do not interfere with he operations of our troops the savages will be severely punished, and compelled to sue for a peace that may prove permanent. It is time that the dusky warriors were taught that the nation can punish its enemies, and that since presents have failed to purchase peace, it can be conquered.

THE SOUTH.

The Savannah Election.

The New York Tribune's special correspon-dence from Savannan, G4., on the 31 instant, give the following version of the recent elec-tion day riot:--The Republicans of this city have been pre-

vented from voting to day for the following reasons:-First, only three bailot boxes were provided by the Ordinary for polling nearly even thousand votes; these boxes were in one room. An immense crowd collected when the polis opened at 7 o'clock, and constantly in-creased thereafter, voting being delayed purreactly by Democrats, who challenged every Republican on the ground of non-payment of 183 68.

Tuis delay resulted in great uneaslness, as it was evident a Democratic trick to compelevery Republican to swear in his vote, and thus overcome their mejority. The uncasiness soon manifested itself by jostling in the crowd, and an officer who desired to stop this trouble was induscreat enough to fire his revolver either directly into or just over the crowd. Tuls shot caused a rush of the Democratic Police, all old Confederate soldiers, ready for the fray, into the living mass of unar med Republicans, mostly blacks, firing about one hundred shots into them.

There was not the least occasion for such vio There was not the least occasion for such vio-lence. So savage was the attack, and so billed were the assailants, that they actually shot two of their own number in the confusion. Little or no resistance was made by the crowd, who fied in all directions having come to the poils. uparmed, in accordance with instructions from the radical leaders. Several were killed, and many more wounded.

The radical leavers. Several were killed, and many more wounded. The Post Commander being appealed to by the civil authorities to furnish troops, demurred, and hesitated hearly half an hour, and then only consented on a formal written application, after quiet was restored, and the Republicans, finding the managers of election nearly all Democratic, and considering the persis-tent challenging and violent demon-strations, threats, and intimidation as conclu-sive evidence of a determination on the part of Democrate that they should not poli their vote, had retired *en masse* from the polls. A large meeting was immediately held, and every colored Republican advised to go quietly home, as it was simply impossible to poli the vote of the city at three boxes, even if there were no challenges to delay, and the treatment already challenges to delay, and the treatment already received by the colored population satisfied them that they could expect nothing but violence.
