From Our Own Correspondent, BALTIMORE, NOV. 8, 1868. These proceedings, after an appeal to the Sultan, were set aside; but, notwithstanding the disapproval of their superiora at Constantinople, the magistrates of Mardin resolved to collect the tax, and seized seven of the principal Christians, who were sent to the camp of the Turkish soldiers and compelled to perform the most odious kinds of servile labor, being at the same time beaten by their guards. The sufferers were then driven through the streets and beaten until they had made application to money-lenders for the amount of the tax, for which an exorbitant interest had to be paid.

PREES FOR LIFE-The witty, brilliant, and, we will add, oftentimes very practical, Bernal-Osborne, has recently broached in Nottingham an idea which is becoming more popular among the democratic masses every day. Speaking of Lord Napier of Magdala, he expressed a wish that he had been made a peer for life, because he thought the time had come when they ought not to see the House of Lords filled with hereditary peers, whose sons may not be fit to sit in the Senate of this country."
