NEWS SUMMARY. Local Affairs.

-For several months past workmen have been busily engaged in remodelling and making extensive repairs and attenations to the time-honored Apprentices' Library, situated at the southwest corner of Filth and Arch streets. The improvements have all been completed, and the Library building was thrown open for the inspection of the public last evening. The Library now ores-nis a very neat and tasty appearance. The exterior of the building has been repained and the interior is replastered and painted, and presents the appearance of a new edifice. The first floor is the giris' library and the upper room is for boys. Handsome oval counters have been erected on either floor, with black wainut tops and with the either floor, with black wainut tops and with the panels painted in initia ion of walnut and maple. The shelving is entirely new, and is painted in initiation of oak. The celling of the upper room has been raised, and all parts of the building is well lighted. At the sonth end of the building there was a lot 12 fest in width on Fifth street by 48 feet in depth. This lot has been purchased and a building erected thereon, the upper room of which is connected with the the upper room of which is connected with the boys' library room, and will be used as a reading and writing room, and the lower floor has been rented out as a store. The stock of books has been increased, and the old ones have been overhauled, renumbered, etc. A number of citizens repaired to the Library last evening and mspec ed the improvements made, -A meeting of the friends of Irish liberty

Chief Lamon testified that Devilu hal been arrested for assaulting the missing man and also the bridge-tender and car-inspector, and while the investigation into the disappear-ance of Mr. Valentine did not connect Devlin with it, Chief Lamon said that be desired Devlin to be committed until the body was found and an inquest held upon it by the Coroner. The Aldernan committed Devin for a further

hearing. -J. A. Kannowasser, Judge, and Thomas J. Dagney, Inspector of the Sixth division of the Fourth ward; Abraham Helmsnatter, Judge, and John Grady, of the Seventh divison of the Fourth ward: William J. Furey, Judge, and John McKeon, Inspector of the Eighth division of the Fourth ward; and Thomas Gillespie, Judge, and Robert Thompson Inspector of the Seventh division of the Third ward, were atraigned before Alderman Jones, at the Central Station, yesterday afternoon, charged with misdemeanor in office, in receiving illegal and frauculent votes on election day. After the transaction of important business of a private nature, officers were elected for the ensuing year. -Bridget Bichmond, 16 years of age, residing

in Cedar street, near Cumberland, was found last evening lying in the street in an uncon-scious condition. It is supposed that she was run over by a vehicle, and that the driver was not aware of the occurrence. She was removed to her home.

Themson had succeeded to the Archbishoorie of Canterbury and Samuel Wilberforce to that of York. It was promptly forwarded to the Associated Press as part of the news of the day. To-day, however, it is officially denied that these promotions in the Church of England have been made.

Panis, Nov. 13 -At the Council of Ministers held at the Tuileries, proof was adduced of the existence of a conspiracy for the overtarov of the existing order of affairs in France. A reso-lution was adopted providing for the use of most vigorous measures for its suppression. Public journals will be exempted from intererence, if they refrain from inciting the people against the Government.

Leon Joseph Hanen, editor of the Siecle, died

to day, aged sixty-nine. MADRID, Nov. 13.-General Dulce, upon leaving for Cuba, will take with him a number of city officials, who are to replace the present administrative authorities. Very extensive powers are granted him in view of the troubled condition of the island. Civil marriages are now of frequent occurrence in Spain. The formation of a Protestant church in Madrid has been sanctioned by the Provisional Govern-ment. Admiral Topete, Minister of Marine, favors the Dake of Montpensier as a candidate for royalty, MADRID, Nov. 13.—The Cap'ain-General of the

Philippine Islands will be removed by order of the Provisional Government. Prim, Secretary of War, has issued an order for idding the attendance of armed soldiers at public meetings. The Papal Nuncio at Madrid continues his rela-

tions with the new Government. VIENNA, Nov. 13.-The bull for putting the army on a war footing has passed the Reichsrath by a large majority, VIENNA, Nov. 13.-News has been receivel of

a collision between two trains on the road near Harrovitz, in Bohemia. Twenty-three persons are reported killed and sixty-one injured.

LONDON, Nov. 13. - Advices from Yokohama, Jaran, to the 8th of October, report that a severe shock of earthquake occurred at Hiogo. HAVANA, Nov. 13.-It recently came to the knowledge of the Government that a band of fourteen perions had started from Havan's for the purpose of creating an insurrection in the Vuelta Abajo region. On the 11th instant the rursh police succeeded in arresting twelve of the party at San Cristobal. Senor Aguive, a merchant of Yaras, who is charged with receiving arms and ammunition for the revolutionists, has been arrested, and was brought here yes-terday. Balmasedo has arrived at Mazzanillo, whence he issued a proclamation, giving the revolutionists eight days to lay down their

arms.

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, November 13. **President Johnson** is unwilling to act in the matter of the charges preferred against McCulloch and Rollins by Gil-mer of Richmond, and has referred them to Mr. Evaris. The impression prevails that Gilmer's effort is a black mailing scheme. **General** Grant will spend one or two days in New York, a day or two at West Point, and on his return will spend a day or two in Phila ielphia. 
