He was accused of attempting to bribe the guard of his imprisoned brother, and also of being one of the leaders of the late revolutionary movement to drive Governor Rubi from power when Corona left for Mexico.

The American residents here are anxiously awaiting the result of the Presidential election. t was generally believed that Grant would be elected and all parties are of opinion that he will iuaugurate a vigorous Mexican policy, and demand accountability for the late outrages and morders of American clitzens. It was also expected that his election would renew with greater force the question of the annexation of

Northwestern Mexico. General Rosecrans' mission to Mexico is regarded as being made at the instance of Grant, and has caused much comment. The Mexican eaders seem to be suspicious of military men travelling through the country. The presence at Port Mazatian of three United States war ve-sels, the Pensacola, Resaca, and Lacsawanna, one a flag ship, added to the general excitement, and gave the place the appearance more of an American than a Mexican city. A terrible storm of wind and rain raged over
