

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

The City Amusements. At the Academy of Music La Belle Helene will be performed this evening, with Mlle. Tostee as "Helene," Mons. Decro as "Paris," Mons. Leduc as "Menelaus," Mons. Lagriffoul as "Calchas," and Mons. Duchoene as "Agamemnon." At the Walnut Mr. Edwin Forrest will appear as "Jack Cade" in Judge Conrad's drama. At the Chestnut The Lancashire Lass will be performed this evening. On Monday another new drama by H. J. Byron, entitled Blue for Blue, will be produced. This play is now running successfully in London and at two theatres in New York. At the Arch The Lancashire Lass will be given this evening. At the Theatre Comique, Seventh street, below Arch, the spectacle of The Gathering of the Clans will be performed this evening. At the American there will be an attractive entertainment. The New Organ at the Cathedral, Logan square, will be opened to-night. Mr. M. H. Cross, Professor H. G. Thumber, Mr. W. A. Newland, Mr. E. A. Clarke, and Mr. David Wood will perform selections from the works of the best composers. Miss OLARA LOUISE KELLOGG will appear in three grand concerts, at Concert Hall, on Wednesday and Friday evenings, November 25 and 27, and on Saturday afternoon, November 28. Miss Kellogg will be assisted by Mad'le Alida Kopp, Signor Lotii, Signor Petrilli, and Herr Koppa. The Germania Orchestra, this afternoon, at Horticultural Hall, will perform selections from Rossini's compositions. CARL SINTZ and MARK HASSLER'S ORCHESTRAS will give a matinee at Musical Fund Hall on Saturday. BLIND TOM will give a concert at Concert Hall this evening.

Dramatic Items.

H. J. Byron's drama of After Dark is now being performed at two theatres in New York, the old Bowery and Niblo's Garden. Mr. Augustin Daly applied for an injunction to prevent the managers from producing the railroad scene, which he claimed was copied from his drama of Under the Gaslight, but he was unsuccessful, and After Dark is allowed to proceed without interruption. Mr. Lester Wallace is making preparations to bring out Shakespeare's comedy of Much Ado About Nothing at his theatre in New York in grand style, as soon as the public get tired of the Lancashire Lass, which is still attracting crowded houses. Under the Gaslight is now being performed at the New York Theatre, and it will keep the stage until December, when the Worrell Sisters will reappear and take charge of the establishment.

A Chinese extravaganza entitled Ching-Chow-hi was produced on Monday at the Theatre Comique, New York, with Miss Susan Galton in the leading role. The New York critics think that Mrs. Lanier's "Marie Antoinette" is a fine performance, but not equal to her "Elizabeth." Mr. G. L. Fox's pantomime of Humpty Dumpty will reach its two hundred and eighty-second representation on Saturday evening. Mrs. D. P. Bowers commenced an engagement at the Park Theatre, Brooklyn, on Monday, and appeared as "Queen Elizabeth."

Musical Items.

Genevieve de Brabant, as interpreted by Grau's troupe, has won its way to public favor at the French Theatre, New York. The performance has been pruned of the objectionable features which were complained of and it now progresses satisfactorily. The New York critics think that the music of this opera is the best that Offenbach has yet written. Max Maretzek commenced a season of Italian Opera at the Academy of Music, New York, on Monday evening. The opening opera was Il Trovatore, in which Madame Agatha Statos appeared as "Leonora," Madame Cellini as "Azucena," Brignoli as "Manrico," and Orlandini as the "Count di Luna." On Tuesday the German members of Maretzek's combined troupe appeared in Beethoven's Fidelio, and for this evening Robert le Diable is announced, with Madame La Grange in the leading role. The portion of Bateman's French troupe which appeared in this city last week opened at Pike's Opera House, New York, on Monday, in Bart's Bazaar, with Iran as "Boulotte," and Abjac as "Barbe Bleue."
