

Coffee at Rio is unchanged in price. HAVANA, Nov. 20 - Later. - Captain-General Lersundi says the statement that five hundred rebels had surrendered o Valmazada, and been pardoned, which was published in the *Diario* this morning, greatly exargerated the facts that despatches to the Government report only about fitty men have so lar given up, but small parties of insurgents are continually coming into Puerto Principe, having abandoned the rebel cause. An official banquet was given to-day in the

Government Palace by the Captain-General, at which Admiral Hoff and officers of the American equadron were the principal guests. General Lersundi made a speech, in the course of which he admitted that had he been born in the United States he would in all probability have been a radical Republican; but being a native of Spain, he was a constitutional monarchist, with liceral ideas. He closed with a toast to the American Union and its leaders and people. Admiral Hoff offered a toast in honor of Spain, saying "the Governments of Spain and the United States had been friends for seventy years, and friends he hoped they would atways ren aln."

FROM MASSACHUSETTS.

The State Securities.

Boston, Nov. 20 .- The angual examination by a committee of the Executive Council on the conduion of the notes and securities in charge of the State Treasurer, has just been finished. funds represented are now seventeen in number, two having been added during the past year, amounting in the aggregate to nearly twelve million dollars. The present market value of the securities is, in nearly every instance, in excess of their cost, the whole increase ex-ceeding the amount of the original investment by more than one million seven hundred thousand. The Treasurer has for several months past been unable to lead the money at his disposal. The committee suggest the expediency of extending the loans in other New England States on terms required of the c.ties and towns in Massachusetts.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 - The Evening Post has secertained that the repeated starms of the yesterday afternoon arose from a deliberate attempt to destroy a large part of this city. Two young men ran from place to place in East Fifteenth street and Sixteenth street, setting fire to a number of stables and outbuild ings, until the whole community was alarmed and all the available force of the Fire Department was demanded to prevent a great conlagration.

We describe in our "Année Scientifique" for 1860 a machine called the apotrope, in-vented by an old naval officer, M. Saluts-a machine that seemed to be a first step, in a practical way, in the construction of these Weights attached to the wheels vehicles. lightened the muscular movements of the rider. The solution of the problem was satiafactory, and it is to be regretted that little attention was paid to this machine. A few improvements would have sufficed to render it of certain utility.

We have helped resurrect the velocipede of 1830, invented by Dreuze-that is, the velocipede of two wheels, with the point of support on the wheels, and propelled by the arms of the rider. The indications are that this time the movement is in earnest, and will lead to important results. One cannot doubt this in view of the interest which this attempt excites, and of the continually increasing number of its proselvtes.

We should be careful, however, not to overestimate the real merits of the velocipede, nor cry victory before victory is reached. Such as it is, this vehicle can be of great use to private individuals for rapid travelling upon good roads; but this, at present, is the only way in which it can be of use. Some think it may be made available for postmen and the nunners of telegraph offices in the country. The idea is an excellent one, but if they consider the bad condition of our country roads during bad seasons of the year, they will agree with us that before this use of the velocipede cau be made practicable it will be necessary to make such improvements in it as will allow of its travelling through all seasons and upon all roads. To place the velocipede, as now constructed, at the disposal of our country postmen and telegraph runners, would be a very unfortunate movement, as it would only result, as in 1830, in replunging this power into the limbo of forgetfulness. Too great haste often destroys the best projects. Let us, then, perfect this machine before speculating upon its use. Let us not gather the fruit while it is yet green, that we may not be obliged to throw it away after having tasted it.
