The English Elections,

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Ry Allantic Cuble. LONDON, Nov. 21.-The Times of this morning gives the following as the result of the elections thus far:-Liberals, 310; Conservatives, 163; Liberal majority, 141.

The Daily News (Liberal) says despatches have been received announcing the election or Charles Buxton, Liberal, for Surrey east; W. Johnston, conservative, for Belfast, Ireland; Bir R. Blennerhasset and Viscount St. Lawrence, both Liberals, from Galway borough, and Lord F. Menners, Conservative, from Lelcestershire, north.

The following Liberals are defeated:-Marguis of Hartington, for Laucashire, northwest, and Right Hon. C Horsman, for Strand.

Serious riots occurred at various places in the kingdom during the elections. At Sligo, Ireland, there was a formidable outbreak, and be, fore it was quelled ten houses were sacked by the mob. There was also a scene of violence at the little town of Ripley, in Derbyshire, where a sharp fight occurred, and many persons were injured. The mob partially demolished several buildings, including the vicarage.

Sr. Louis, Nov. 21.-Later despatches from Bear River City state that the city is now quiet under martial law, and business is going on as usual. It is reported that twenty of the mob are dead and thirty-five wounded, two of them mortally. A mob collected in the mountains has sent for a physician to attend the wounded. and also sent word that the women and children must leave the town, as they intended to march on it four hundred strong and burn it. The Mayor has telegraphed for troops, which are expected to-morrow.


