Miss Kellogg's Concert. Miss Kellogg's brilliant success in Europe was a source of great satisfaction to her friends and critical admirers in this country, for, independently of her merits as an artist, she has the rare faculty of establishing a sert of intimacy with each member of her audience. And if her style, culture, and the qualities of her voice were less worthy of commendation, this personal magnetism would still make her one of the most popular singers on the stage. Miss Kellogg, too, is an American by birth and education, and it was here that her merits obtained the fullest recognition before she went before strange people to have the approving verdict of her friends at home confirmed. Her triumphs in Europe were no more than what her most discreet admirers expected, but as the first really fine lyric artist that we have sent across the Atlantic, the enthusiasm which she created in London was esteemed to be as much a national as a personal compliment,

Miss Kellogg has always been a great favorite in this city, and her reception on Wednesday evening, when she made her first appearance after her return from Europe, was as cordtal as she could have desired, and the only cause for regret was that she did not have an opportunity to display her powers to the fullest extent in an operatic performance. The first air, the polacea from Bellini's opera of I Puritant, was sung with fine expression and in answer to an encore she gave Longfellow's ballad of "Beware" in a very be witching manner, accompanying herself on the plano. The duet from the Nozze de Figure of Mozart, with Signor Petrelli, was also deservedly applanded. Instead of the "Voi one Sapete," which was announced in the programme, an aria from Don Giovanni was given in the second part of the entertainment, and an encore of this elicited a delicious I alfan kiss song, which was repeated in compliance with an enthusiastic demand. A trio from Verdi's Attila with Signori Lotti

and Petrelli concluded the performance, and sent the audience home in the most pleasurable state of mind. Miss Kellogg's trip to Europe has improved her both in appearance and execution, and she comes before the American public again a finer artist than ever. The programme on Wednesday evening was excellent and the performance altogether very superior. Signor Petrelli is a fair tenor, equal to concertroom requirements, and Signor Lotti has a fine baritone voice, but he does not sing with over-much expression. Mad'ile Alida Topp does credit to her tutor Liszt, and her piano execution is something remarkable. It is doubtful whether we have ever had a lady planist in this city before who could equal her in her command over the instrument, and in her firm and vigorous touch. The fantasia by Liszt, in the first part, and the "Polka de la Rhine" by Raff, in the second part, were both encored, and in answer Mad'lle Topp gave a couple of waltzes by Chopin and Raff.

Among the most enjoyable portions of the entertainment were Herr Kopta's solos on the violin. The "Reverle" by Vieuxtemps, and the "Cascade" by A. de Konski, in the first part, were applauded in the heartiest manner. The Paganinian variation, executed on the G string only, in the second part, was a remarkable exhibition of skill, and it obtained an encorewhich Herr Kopta answered by giving an imitation of the flageolet and bagpipes.

The concert was in the highest degree enjoyable, and while we regret that Mr. Strakosch has found it necessary to make his present stay in Philadelphia with Miss Kellogg so short, we hope that he will allow us the pleasure of seeing her again before the season is over.
