NEW YORK, Nov. 30 .- Panama advices of November 28 state that when General Corresso. arrived at Chiriqui he found the place abaudoned. He then went to Santiago and found the enemy had also abandoned that place. Proceeding to Hatello, the enemy, 400 strong attacked Correoso, and a battle ensued, lasting three hours, when the enemy fled in disorders leaving 52 killed, among them their leader, and many wounded, a number of prisoners, and al, their arms and ammunition. The Government lost three killed and eight wounded, among the latter General Pedro Goita. This buttle has put an end to the civil war in the State of Panama. The revolutionary movement in Costa Rica has proved successful, and President Castro has been deposed and Jamenez installed in his
