The New Ironsides - She is Again Affoat. About a year ago it was announced that Mr. David Boyd, Jr., had purchased what was lett of the famous frigate, the "New Ironsides," after she was barned at League Island, and that he intended to have the ship raised. Difficult as this seemed, when the cuermons weight of the hull and machinery of the vessel was considered, it has been to a large extent accom-The first step was to engage the necessary appliances and men, the pontoons, the divers, etc. By means of these and the derricks used all the heavy plates that had been dis-placed by the fire, and which had fallen into the hull of the vessel, were removed, and also the four large boilers, these latter weighing in the aggregate two hundred tons. The boilers were found to be uninjured by the fire. When all the loose from had been removed, eightee two-inch chains were swung under the hull Some of these were in thirty-two feet water near the stern of the ship. After the chains were placed and attached to the pontoons, the latte were sunk to the water's edge at low tide, and as the tide raised at the next flood the enormous hull of the Ironsides was slowly lifted from the mud, where it had lake so long, and once more floated, supported by the postoous. On Tues day a teri oon of this week the Ironsi les and the pontoons were got into position to be drifted with the flood tide up the river, and the waolmass, guided by steam tags, was carried about a mile up to a favorable spot on the Horse Stoe.

where it was placed on the Shoal.
Yesterday the ves el was sail further lifted about six feet, and by flood tide of to-day it is expected to rate her sufficiently out of the water so as to take her over the bar to the Jersey shore. When that is done sho is to be finally pumped out. It is believed that her costly engines have not been much injured by the fire. If this shall turn out to be the case, and the hull is not too much damaged. is the purpose of her present owner to rebuild the ship. This whole enterprise is of the most

remarkable character for a private citizen.

The magnitude of this undertaking will be more readily uncerstood by considering the following details of the size and weight of the ship:- Her dimensions were 240 feet in length 58 feet 6 inches in beam, 25 feet depth. Her armament was 16 11-inch Dahlgren guns and 2 200-pound Parrotts. The weight of wood work in her hull was 1965 tons; icon plating, 820 tons; engines and boliers, 300 tons; auchors and chains, 73 tons; and copper sheathing and bolts, 55 tons, making a total of 3213 tons. Captain 1. J. Merritt has had the superintendence of the work, and his pontoons were those applied for this successful result.

#### WALL STREET.

Its Shadows - An Accd ex-Clergyman Charged with Robbery. The N. Y. Times of yesterday morning con-

tained the following:-Luther G. Bingham, who is 75 years of age, and resides at No. 170 Congress street, Brooklyn, and who for many years was a clergyman in good standing, but has latterly been engaged as a broker in Wall street, was yesterday arrested by Detective Reilley, of the Twentieth Precinct. upon a warrant issued at the instance of Samuel B. Tinsdale, clerk of Robert Batle, No.

27 Wall street.
The complaint states that on the 28th day of November Bingham purchased of Baile \$9200 in gold, giving in payment his check for \$11,500 on the American National Bank, and his due bill for \$66.62, and a check for \$1000, purporting to be drawn by Richard Camerman, on the Pacific National Bank. These checks having been received, Bugham took away the gold and the checks being afterwards presented at the backs, payment was refused upon the ground that the drawers had no deposits to meet them.

It was therefore charged that Biagham had stolen the \$9300 in gold by "trick and device." The accused is a man of good appearance, and looking younger than the age he gives by almost a score of years, and when arraigned upon the charge said that he was innocent of all intended eaud in the matter, and that the transaction on his part was hones, as he hoped to be able to prove. Justice Ledwith considered that there was sufficient in the case to instify further inquiry, and Bingham was accordingly held for an examination, which was set down for 10 o'clock this morning.

When, I should be curious to know, were all the powers of crudity and flatulence fully explained to his majesty's ministers? At what period was this great plan of conquest and consupation ully developed? In whose mind was the idea of destroying the pride and the plas-ters of France first engendered? Without castor oil they might for some months, to be sure have carried on a lingering war; but can they do without bark? Will the people live under a government where antimonial powders can not be procured? Will they bear the loss of mer-cury? There's the rub! Depend upon it, the absence of the materia medica will soon bring them to their senses, and the cry of Bourbon and boius burst from the Baltic to the Mediterrancan!

## Catharine II of Russia.

A curious letter from the Empress Catherine II of Russia to the Graud Duke has been published in the "Transactions of the Ecclesiastical Academy of Kieff." In this letter are

found the following passages:—
I have been told by learned men that Egypt at the time of her greatest prosperity excluded all strangers from her territory, and thereby obtained a reputation for political wisdom. Follow this example. Like a good father, protect your family against everything that could injure it; see that no book, no newspaper, no caricature is introduced in Russia of which you do not approve. The people should have no opinion but that of their sovereign. You should only allow a certain amount of enlightenment to panetrate among your subjects, none that could prove injurious either to yourself or to them.

It is impossible to govern according to your own will a people that reasons.

I advise you to establish a strict censorship in every custom house for books coming from abroad. I could quote books which have done more harm to sovereigns than a battle or a lost province.

Do not give people too much time for reflection. Nations are not created for this; they should not be reasoners. There is nothing more difficult than to govern a people which wants a reason for everything. The business of the people is to work and be silent.

The pen of an able writer does more harm to a Government than a war. Send to Siberia every writer who thinks of aspiring to the dignity of a statesman.
