The Navy Department-Annual Report of the Mon. Gideon Welles.

The Annual Report of Hor. Gideon Welles, Secretary of the Navy, bas been completed and printed for transmission to Congress on Tuesday next, with the message of President Johnson. The report shows the present naval lorce, the different squadrons and the vessels attached, and the injury and destruction of vessels by earthquakes, the reduction of force in navy yards; speaks of the survey of the North Pacific: fron clads; League Island; and contains the amount of expenses for the fiscal year and estimates for the next. It also has chapters devoted to the reports of the several bureans of the department. One of the most interesting features of the report is the account of the extended tour of Admiral Farragut, which covers several pages. There are also reports from several oill cers of the navy in regard to the terrible earth quakes in Peru. The exhibits of the naval force contain the following information:-The number of vessels in squadron service as

cruisers, storeships, and returning is 42, carry ing 411 gans-a reduction during the year of 14 vessels, carrying 56 guns. The number of vessels of all descriptions in use as cruisers, store ships, receiving ships, tugs, etc., is 81, carrying 693 guns—a reduction from last year of 22 vessels, carring 205 guns. The total number of vessels borne upon the navy list is 206, carrying 1743 guns — a reduction during the year of 32 vessels, carrying 126 guns. The following tables exhibit the present employment and condition of the naval force:-Cruising vessels in squadron service 35 356 guns: vessels returning from squadrons 3 24 guns; storeships for squadrons 4, 31 guns; special and lake service 3, 19 gans; apprentice-ship 1, 11 gans; practice vessels and in use at Naval Academy 10, 115 guns; receiving ships 6, 92 gups; quarters for officers at League Island and marine barracks, Norlolk 2, 27 guns; tugs at navy yards and stations, powder boats, etc., 17, 18 guns. Total in use, 81 vessels, 693 guns,

Iron-clads vessels laid up 46, 107 guns; ironclad vessels not completed, 5, 18 guns; steam sloops not completed, 15, 253 guns; line-of-battle ships not completed, 2, 80 guns. Other vessels laid up repairing, fitting for sea and to, sale, 57, 572 guns. Total number of vessels of an descriptions in use, building, repairing, fitting for sea, etc., 206, 1743 gaps. The vessels of the pavy are classified as follows: -Vessels of the first rate of 2400 tons and upwards, 35, 662 guns; vessels of the second rate of 1200 to 2400 tons, 37, 483 guns; vessels of the third rate of 600 to 1200 ton-, 76, 414 guns; testels of the fourth rate under 600 tons, 18, 184 guns. Total, 206 vessels,

1743 guns. The following table indicates the character of the vessels:—Iron-ciad vessels, 52, 129 guns; screw steamers, 95, 938 guns; paudle-wheel steamers, 28, 199 guns; sailing vessels, 31, 477 guns. Total 206 vessels 1743 guns.

The organization of the squadrons remains essentially the same as when the annual report was made. Some changes of commanding officers and of yessels have taken place, and the force of each squadron has, in consequence of the limited number of seamen allowed by the act of 17th of Jone last, been necessarily re suced. The Secretary says that if our com Lerce and shipping interests have not recovered from the depression consequent upon the war, and are not as expanded as formerly, it is from no hattention or neglect on the part of the navy. Since the squadrons were reorganized our countrymen and their interests abroad have been as vigilantly guarded and protected on

every sea and at every accessible point as at any former period.

It has been the purpose of the department to have one or more of our naval vesse's visit annually every commercial port where American capital is employed, and that a man-of-war should not be long absent from the vicinity of every merchant ship that might need assistance or protection. To accomplish this purpose, and meet the requirements of the department, great activity and vigilance were necessary with our limited navy, numbering, in men and ships, less than one fourth the effective force of any one of the principal maritime powers. Yet the work has been performed with energy and zeal, and the views of the department well sustained. Admiral D. G. Farragut, who was in command of the European squadron at the date of last report, returned to New York in the flag-hip on

the 10th of November, leaving the squadron in the ree of Commodore A. M. Pennock. The Franklin is to return with Rear-Admiral William Radiord, who is designated to command the squadron, which is composed of the following vessels - Franklin, Hagship, 39 guns; Ticcuneroga, 9 gune; Swa ara, 10 gune; Frolic, 5 guns; Gard, s oreship, 3 guns.

Admiral Farragut has visited during the year Holland, Belgiam, England, Scotland, France, Portugal, Some, Italy, Austria, Pressia, Greece, Turkey, and Morocco. His reception in every which he has visited was equally flatter ing with his reception the preceding year in the north of Europe, and cannot be less acceptable to the Government and people of the United States. While honoring that distinguished officer, the sovereigns and other high officials of these powers have availed themselves of the occasion to compl ment in friendly terms the cation he represents. It is a gratification to remark, while noting the movements of this cincer and his squadron, that in no instance has an appeal been made for his interference in any manuer to relieve or extend aid to our countrymen scattered along the shores where the flag has been exhibited, nor has any appli cation been made to him to assert and vindicate their rights. Throughout Europe the rights of American citizens are respected, and wherever the flag has been carried by the navy the privi-leges to which they are entitled, and which are guaranteed by treaty stipulations and international law, have been asserted and main-

Rear-Admiral Henry H. Bell, who was in con mand of the Asiatic squadron at the date o the late report, was drowned at Osaca, on the 14th of January, by the upsetting of a boat in which he was crossing the bar. The command devolved upon Commodore John R. Golds boroogn as senior officer until the arrival o Rear-Admiral S. C. Rowan, who sailed from New York in the Piscataqua on the 16th of December, and assumed command at Singapore on the 18th

The squadron is composed of the following vessels;—Pascataqua (flacship), 23 guns; Oueida. 8 guns; Iroquois, 6 guns; Asbuelot, 6 guns; Monceacy, 16 guns; Unadilla, 5 guns; Aroos-took, 5 guns; Maumee, 8 guns; Idaho (store an l bospital ship), 7 guns. The Shenandoah is on her way home from this squadron under order, issued in June last. The Hartford arrived at

New York in August.
The United States Minister, Mr. Van Valkenburg, was of the opinion that our Government should be represented by a strong naval force on the occasion of the opening of the ports of Osaka and Hiogo. Rear-Admiral Bell concurred in this opinion, and assembled as many vessels of the squadron off Hiogo as were available, including the Hartford, Iroquois, Monocacy, Aroostook, Oncida, and Shenandoan. The latter vessel conveyed the United States Minister from Yokobama to consummate the terms of the treaty. No serious trouble was apprehended, bu, certain discontented factions were known to exist. It was there ore thought that the display of foreign power would prove a whole ome restraint on the turbulent and disaffected, Agreeably to a rangements, Osnca and Hogo were quietly opened to foreigners on the first of

January, Rear-Admiral James G. Palmer, who was in command of the North Atlantic squatron at the date of the last report, died of yillow tever at St. Thomas on the 7th of December. The dagship Susquelianna being infected with the lisease, was, on her return to New York, phiced out of commission, and until the Confuseook was ready for sea, the Wampanaug was used as was ready for sea, the wathpanage was used as a flagshir. Rent-Admiral H. K. Hoff hoisted his flag on board the latter vessel on the 22d of February. The squarron is now composed of the Contobook, flagship, 13 guns; Sacs, 19 guns; Princheot, 9 guns; Yande, 6 guns; Gettisburg, 9 guns; Moste, 6 guns.

The Rear-Admiral commanding has in the

flagship visited many of the important points within the limits of his command. During the months of May and June he was at St. Thomas, Santa Cruz, Point a Petre, St. Pierre, and Laguayra, Aspinwall, Port-au-Prince, and Key West. He is now making a second cruise through the West India Islands, and at last novices was at Havana. The other vessels or the squadron have been actively employed, and have given assistance to our merchantmen and protection to our citizens whenever needed.
The South Atlantic squadron, under command

of Rear-Admiral Charles H. Davis, is composed of the following vesicls—Guerriere, fluesnip, 21 guns; Pawnec, 11 guns; Quinnebang, 6 guns; Wasp, 3 guns; Kansas, 8 guns. Two yessels were ordered home in consequence of the reducion of the naval force by act of Congre's. Huron arrived in New York in October, and the Shamokin is daily expected at Philadelphia. The continuation of the war between the attied powers and Paraguay has rendered it advisable to keep some portion of the force within as con-very at reach as practicable of military opera-tions.
