Since his conviction the clothes he wore, the razor, and other positive proofs of his guilt, have been tound and away in the outbuildings of the house in which he was discovered when arrested, but he could not be put in jeopardy a accoud time for mis life.

The man Stephen T. Denny, who was tried last week for the murder of Charles Childs, was found guilty only of man-laughter and recom mended to mercy. The person he killed and destroyed his domestic peace by seducing a way his wife. There is much sympathy for this man, and the bestef is he will soon be pardoned.
