This firm esti-mated their loss at about \$45,000. The origin of the fire is usknown, but it is thought to be the work of thieves who were trying to get into the adjoining building, as a ladder was found in the back yard that did not belong to the premises.

Council of the Six Nations.

Council of the Six Nations. The Buffalo Advertiser of Wednesday says that the "delegations from the several tribes comprising the Six Nations of Indians met in council at the Council House on the Cattaraugus Reservation, on Wednesday of this week, for the purpose of concluding a treaty with the General Government in relation to the lands in Kansas ceded to them in 1838. Special Com-missioner Walter R. Irwin attended the coun-cil on the part of the Government. The busi-ness of the council was satisfactorily concluded last evening, the treaty signed, and the council last evening, the treaty signed, and the council dissolved. By the terms of the treaty the title of the Indians to the lands in Kasnas is extinof the industry in the lands in Kashas is exitin-guished, the Government agreeing, in conside-ration, to pay the sum of three hundred and twenty dollars for each and every person en-titled to participate in the beneficial provisions of the treaty of January 15, 1838 (about four thousand in number), the sum to be invested in United States bonds, to be held in trust by the Secretary of the Interior, the interest thereon to be paid annually to the members of the seve-ral tribes. The council was numerously attended, the proceedings harmonious and interesting, and the business was concluded with the utmost despatch."

HAVANA, Dec. 12. - The Diario says Count Baimaseda has already caused to the insurrec-tionists the loss of 570 men, killed and wounded, and his match from Paerto Principe to Nuevita: will add to the number. The *Diario* also publishes an intercepted

letter from the General of the insurrectionistto General Cespedes, in which the Marquis of Santa Luisa is reported to have been severely wounded. Prominent Liberals and Cubans in Spain have sent telegrams to influential citizens of Havana, stating that General Dulce goes to Cuba fully authorized to modify the duties and to govern the Island on a liberal basis. The granting of a definite constitution is reserved for the decision of the Cortes, but the new Captain-General is authorized to issue a general amnesty to all the insurgents upon their laying down their arms.
