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and returned to Nucvitas yesterday with reinforcements. Additional troops will be forwarded to him. The steamer Española has arrived with the reinforcements from Spain. Two steam transports with 2080 troops are expected to-morrow. A battalion of volunteers raised the siege of the hospital at Holguin, and the insur-rectionists withdrew from the town.

It is expected that Count Valmaseda will march immediately from Nucvitas, and make an attack upon Bayamo, the stronghold of the revolutionists. Various and conflicting rumors are in circulation in regard to the late military operations in the interior. Cubaos here say the Government troops have suffered a defeat, but their assertions are not confirmed by reports

from the seat of war. The correspondent of the New York Times at Bayamo reports that the character of the war is changing. The Spanish troops are disgusted lenient and generous policy of with the Government in pardoning the rebels, and refuse to give or receive quarter.

The revolutionists are confidently expecting disturbances in Spain which will prevent the sending of reinforcements to Cuba. At the same time the planters are more anxious to secure their sugar crops than to fight, and are generally sympathizers with the revolution.

Parties in Havana who advocate the revolution claim that the insurgents are receiving supplies of arms and even rein'orcements of men from the United States. 
