## LYNCH LAW.

Whe Verdict in the New Albany Affair— Something More About the Renos. From the Louiville Courier-Journal, Dec. 18.

The Coroner's jury concluded its investigation of the Reno and Anderson hanging case on Saturday, and rendered a verticit yesterday morning. The New Albany Ledger was relused morning. The New Albany Ledger was relused a copy of the verdict, on the ground that the jury conducted the investigation in secret session. It learns, however, that the following is the substance of the document:—The jury summoned by the Co:oner of Floyd county to hold an inquest over the bodies of Frank R no, Simeon Reno, William Reno, and Charles Anderson found dead, hanging by the neck, in the County jail in New Albany township, Floyd county, on Saturday, December 12, find that the deceased came to their death by hanging at the hands of parties unknown to the jury. The jury also find that the persons who did the jury also find that the persons who did the banging came to this city on the Friday night train over the Jeffersonville, Madi-on, and Indianapolis Railroad; that they came in a separate car, arriving here between the hours of three and four o'clock Saturday morning, and proceeding to the jail, took forcible possesson of the same, defying the authority of the Sheriff and jail guards, who were overpowered, and the former, while in the exercise of his duty, was shot in the arm and struck out the head. They also find that after hanging the deceased the parties locked the jail doors and those of the jail residence, and carried off and those of the jail residence, and carried off the keys, making the inmates prisoners until the keys were returned by Mr. Durrette, who they took prisoner to the depot to prevent an salarm being given; that they took forcible pos-session of the train, on the Jeffersonville road, and they left the city about 4 o'clock, going beyond the State Prison near Jeffersonville, when the train was stopped and they fied in every direction.
Old Wilkes Reno, two sons, and a daughter

remain. The mother has deceased since her sons were imprisoned at New Albany. John Reno is in the Missouri State Prison, serving out a twenty-years' sentence for "sale-blowing" in that State, At the time Frank and Sim. and were hanged, Clinton was in Missouri trying to get Jack released. Jack had sent word that if he had \$5000 he could get out, and Clint. had raised the money and gone there, but a telegram from his wife brought him back without his brother. Reno and Auderson, the express robbers, had a private conversation with the Governor while in jail in Toronto, at which Reno volunteered the statement that he was a partner in the robbery, but that Anderson was not; that the latter was one of the gang, and was present at the inception of the plan which was afterwards
