SMUGGLING.

More About the Gigantic Frauds in New York.

A case has recently been revealed, showing that Mesers. Feigelstock and Bendino, imthat Messrs. Feigelstock and Bendino, importers, formerly doing business in Roade street, in this city, have probably defrauded the Government largely by smuggling shawls, siks, etc., through the Custom House. When the matter was made public, it is said that both parties fled from the States and took refuge in Canada. It is now averred that Messrs, Feigelstock and Bendino were not the principals, but simply the agents of Mesers. Guiterman Bros.,

importers, at No. 63 Leonard street.

An officer of the Treasury Department worked up the case, and on Saturday last arrested Sigismund and Simon Guiterman, mentioned above, as the guilty parties.

The following are the affidavits in the case:

Southern District of New York, ss. -Thomas Toole deposed-Am an agent of the Treasury Department; on or about the 20th day of November last I received an official letter from the Commissioner of Customs, stating that he had information that large frauds had been and were being committed on the customs revenue, by certain merchants or importers of foreign merchandise in the city of New York; that de-ponent called on the person who gave this information to the Commissioner, who then stated to him that two mercantile firms, S. Bendino & Co., and Feigelstock & Co., doing business in Reed street, in this city, had been for a long time importing a large quantity of for a long time importing a large quantity of silks and other valuable dress goods, which were involced and passed through the Custom House as clocks, clock-shades, etc.; that on application at the Custom House he ascertained that Bendino & Co. had recently imported by the Ville de Paris sixteen cases involced and entered at the Custom House as clocks, glass shades, etc.; that on the 28th November last the firm of Guiterman (Simon and Sigismund Guiterman), doing busi-(Simon and Sigismund Gutterman), doing business at No. 63 Leonard street, were engaged in defrauding the revenue by undervaluing the goods, wares, and merchandise imported by them: that a warrant was obtained from the Judge of the United States District Court for the seizure of the books, accounts, and corres pondence of Guiterman Brothers; that on examination of the same and comparing them with the records in the Custom House, the fact that Bendino & Co. and Feigelstock & Co. had for some time past been engaged in importing silks and other valuable dress goods, the same being invoiced and entered at the Custom House as clocks and glass shades, etc., with intent to defraud the United States Government. The parties were taken before Commissioner Betts, to whom they furnished bail in the sum of \$50,000 each, and the examination was appointed for to-morrow.
