MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

"A Flash of Lightning" at the Arch. Augustin Daly's drams of A Flash of Lightning was produced last evening at the Arch to a full house. The work of preparing the effects of the piece continued up to the moment of the rising of the curtain, and it was even feared that it could not be got ready in time. Notwithstanding this, the play went off very smoothly for a first night, and if the applause of the audience is to be considered as an evidence of anecess, it may be pronounced a decided hit. The success of the plece, however, is to be attributed entirely to spirited acting and fine scenic effects, for, considered by itself, it is a mass of unmitigated trash, and of all the worthless plays that have proceeded from the pen of Daly It presents about the least claims to favorable notice. We do not look for nature or probability in such a production as this, but the story should be told in an understandable manper. The author of Under the Gaslight, nowever, has considered his plot merely as somathing upon which to string as many sensational effects as possible; and if we take this view of the case, and estimate the merit of a drama by the number of stariling situations it contains, A Frash of Lightning might be considered a very superior production. The plot turns upon the fact that a gold chain disappears mysteriously from a room where it had been placed. A young lady suspects that her lover, who had just quarrelled with her, is the thief, and to shield him she allows the suspicion to attach to herself. After various adventures in an all-night cellar in the First ward, New York, upon a burning steamboat, and submitting to indignities innumerable. it is discovered that a flash of lightning was the purloiner of the missing chain; and the minds of the young lady, her lover, and her family are relieved by finding the gold of the chain metted by the lightning and scattered in fragments among the coal in a scuttle. There are some tolerably good popular hits in the dialogue, which serve to keep the audience amused, but there is a vast amount of irrelevant matter which is tedious, uninteresting, and so utterly absurd that it ought to be ruthlessly cut out, and the dimensions of the play reduced by one-third at least. For instance, what can be more ridiculous than the gay and festive clerk, on a crowded steamboat. singing a serenade outside of a young lady's state-room door? The characters in the piece are commonplace in the extreme, and the actors are entitled to considerable credit for giving them a recognizable human likeness.
