The Policy of the New Mayor. Tais morning the oath of office was administered to the Hon Daniel M. Fox, and he entered upon his duties as Mayor of Philadelphia. As is usual in such cases, he delivered an inaugural address, which will be found elsewhere. In that address we see so much to heartily commend that we earnestly congratulate him on the promises he makes of a policy which, if carried out, will secure to him the commendation of every class of citizens. He carefully eschews politics, and devotes himself entirely to the affairs of the city which are of a kind to merit his official attention. If we can take the sentiments he utters as a guide to the administrative rale during his term, we are relieved by the pledge that the city will not be injured by any substitution of the deputy sheriffs of Mr. Peter Lyle for the present police force, but she will have a class of sober, respectful, and diligent officers of whom we may be proud-This Mr. Fox positively guarantees us, and we believe that he will carry out his professions. His remarks in regard to the increase of crime are sadly true-The city needs a thorough purgation of ruffianism, and that purgation must come from the Mayor's office. The policy which he favors with regard to finances also meets with our cordial approbation. It is preëminently the duty of Councils to economize; but when, after all just reductions, there remain heavy expenses, the tax rate should be such as to meet the expense and not necessitate a yet larger payment in the future by funding annual deficiencies. If Mr. Fox adopts in good faith and with active energy the reforms he favors, he will receive for himself universal commendation. Irrespective of party, he will in all proper actions receive from our hands. and we feel convinced that he will from the great mass of the Republican party, most cordial support in the performance of his duty and full credit for every worthy deed.

It may not be inappropriate to say a word in regard to the outgoing Mayor. Mr. Morton McMichael leaves the position he has filled for three years with the hearty good feeling of every class of our people, for the courtesy, zeal, and honesty with which he has filled the office. He has faithfully discharged the duties of the post. He has presided over the city as her representative with great credit to her and himself. Genial and warm hearted, he has made the visits of those to whom Philadelphia has extended her freedom a rare pleasure, while to the heavier labors of his office he has carried a thorough acquaintance with the needs of our city and an unimpeachable honesty. In retiring to private life he has both the respect and the affection of those whose executive he has been.

The Frankness of Dimmick and the Reticence of Randall. WE announced yesterday that the Hon. Samuel J. Randall had been doing the Thirteenth and Fifteenth Streets Pasenger Railway Company the kindness to frank their calls for meetings of the stockholders. As everybody who has been accused recently of abusing the franking privilege has rushed forthwith into print with an explanation, we naturally expected Mr. Randall to do the same. We have not yet, however, heard from the First District Representative on the subject.

This reticence of Mr. Randall has a sinister look, when we peruse the statement made by the firm of "Dimmick & Co.," of New York, who were recently detected in the act of distributing the circulars of their publishing concern under the frank of Congressman Lincoln. A more artless document has never fallen under our notice. It appears that "Dimmick & Co." were connected with a political erganization by which Mr. Lincoln's frank had been in constant use. When the recent campaign closed, a large number of blank envelopes were still on hand, and each of them bore the frank of Mr. Lincoln. "Dimmick & Co." thought it a pity to waste these magical envelopes, and, moreover, theirs "was a business that increased rather than diminished the pestal revenue, their publications being sent in a large degree through the mails, and every circular sent tending to increase the demand and benefit the department." For this reason "Dimmick & Co." think they "certainly must claim exemption from the serious charges made by" Mr. Lincoln. If the same principle were to be applied to the business of every publishing house in the country, we might, of course, expect the postoffice revenues to take such rapid strides by way of increase that the heavy deficiency would disappear, and a handsome yearly surplus take its place ! A more consummate specimen of unblushing impudence we have never encountered. Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives, there is but one way in which you can flank such enterprising firms as that of "Dimmick & Co." abolish the franking abuses by abolishing the franking privilege in toto.

The Lincoln Monument.

In an article a few days ago on the general subject of monument building, we expressed a doubt as to whether the memorial to Mr. Lincoln, which it was proposed to erect in this city would be completed during the present

generation. We are gratified at the information that we were in error on this point, that the monument is in course of construction, and that it is likely to prove a credit to the city as a work of art. We have not desired to convey the idea that we are opposed to monuments, but we think that they are too often commenced unadvisedly by a few persons, who fail to receive the support and encouragement of the community at large, for the simple reason that there is no general interest in such enterprises. No more appropriate ornaments for our public grounds and edifices can be found than monuments to the great men of the nation or State, provided that they have genuine artistic merit to commend them. It too often happens, however, as in the case of the Washington National Monument, that such structures are commenced in haste, without counting the their projectors forgetting the important fact that others are not as enthusiastic as themselves. With regard to the Lincoln monument in this city, we are only solicitous that it shall, for the credit of Philadelphia, be put up within a reasonable time, and that, when completed, it shall be such a tribute to a great man's memory as we need not be ashamed of. The gentlemen who have the matter in hand are, we believe, actuated by a desire to do their whole duty in the premises. What has already been accomplished towards the completion of the Lincoln monument the following letter will explain: -
