-Governor Bowie, of Maryland, says that General Grant is a man to lead, not to be led, and that be will support our next President in every effort for the reconstruction and perpetuity of the Union.

-John P. Stockton, Democrat, was unanl-mously nominated by the Democratic members of the New Jersey Legislature yestering for the United States Senate, vice Frederick T. Frelinghuysen, whose term expires March 4.

#### Foreign Affairs.

LONDON, Jan. 13 .- The reports of the capture by the Turkish forces of members of the Cretan insurrectionary Government are confirmed. Four of the Cretan officials were silled, and the rest were taken prisoners. The books and documents of the government fell into the hands of the Turks.

LONDON, Jan. 13 .- The London merchants are extensively petitioning the Government to restore the mail service between Southampton and New York by a contract with the Hamburg-American Steamship Company. The petitioners show that the average time made by the Hamburg-American steamers is better than that of several others, and equal to the best to which mail service is accorded.

PARTS, Jan. 13 .- It is stated to day that Bizo Rangabe, the present Ambassador at Paris from Greece, has been recalled to replace Bulgaris as President of the Ministry, PARIS, Jan. 13.-The official journal reports

that the conference on the Eastern question held a brief session yest rolar, and abjourged until Thursday. Ranguoe, the precian Minister, was not present.

The conduct of the Greek Government in taking exception to the excusion of its repretaking exception to the exclusion of the repre-sentative from the conference is condemned, for it is agreed that Greece as ented to the pro-priety of a similar exclusion from the Congress of 1856, though the Sablime Perfe was then represented in that body, and this is held as a precedent for the action of the present con-legence. terence.

VIENNA, Jan. 13. - The Ecening Post, the official journal, said, in i's issue of yesterday, that Count you Bismark, the Prussian Prime Minis-, had told Count de Wimpflien, the Austrian Minister at Berlin, that the re ention of Baron yon Beust in office, would provoke serious action on the part of Prussis.

VIENNA, Jan 13,-A circular from the Sublime Porte to the European powers, justifying its recent action against Greece. is published here. It says the Turkish Government does not expect that the conference at Paris will arrive at any settlement. The ultimatur sent to Greece a declaration that the internal affairs of the Ottoman Empire must not be interfered with.
