NEWS SUMMARY. City Affairs.

-Recently United States Marshal Ellmaker made a setzure of whicky which had been levied upon by the Sheriff, and took possession of it. Yesterday the matter was brought to the attention of Judge Cadwalader, who directed that the whicky should be restored to the Sheriff, but instructed the Marshal that after the Sheriff had disposed of it he could again take possession of it, as it had been condemned as coutraband.

-Yesterday afternoon the body of the miss-ing clerk of Messis, Caldwell & Co. was discov-ered in the ruins of the store, Chesnut street, above Ninth, on the second floor, near Chesnut street. From the fact that a ring and a buach of keys known to belong to J. Fontaine Polk were tound near the remains, they are believed to have been those of that person. Mr. Poly was in the twenty-third year of his age, and was from Winchester, Va. He was unmarried. His mother was in the city at the time of his melancholy death, she having arrive on a visit the night of the fire. The body was taken to the residence of Dr. Philip Leidy, No. 489 North Sixth street.

Philadelphia, from the Postmaster-General, for \$749.58, on Davis H. Supposing it to be the well-known and reputable firm of Alsop & Co., and de-fendant producing letters of credit, the sale was made. Draits were given in payment, and the alcohol was delivered. Subsequently, upon the suspicion that something was wrong, in-quiry was made, and it was ascertained that there were two firms of Alsop & Co. in the same street, one of which stands high and the other does not. Since then the alcohol could not be traced nor the money collected on the draft, the person on whom the drafts were drawn not being found. The accused told the Alderman that he was the more agent of other parties, and he acted honestly in that transac-tion, as he would be able to show at the proper time. He was held for trial.

Foreign Gossip.

-The latest attempt of the Wababees to stir up a revolt among the Mohammedan population of India is not likely to be frustrated without considerable trouble. The police, as we learn from recent accounts, are constantly making arrests. One correspondent says that the Government has been "haughtily indifferent" to the progress of the conspiracy, but this reproach scarcely seems justified by what we know of its proceedings. When the plot was discovered the leaders were at once warned that they were under surveillance. Their followers were cowed by the knowledge that the Government was fully prepared to deal with them the moment they came forth from their hiding places. The consequence of this may be seen in the denunciations of the new "crescentade" put forward by well-known Mohammedans. Monlvie Abbas Ali has told his fellow-countrymen that defeat and suffering will inevitably attend their organization. Although the Government cannot afford to relax its vigilance for some time to come, we may reasonably hope that it has gained too firm a hold upon the plot and the originators of it to allow it to do any further mischief.

-The annual returns of shipbuilding on the Clyde have just been published, and, as usual, compare favorably with those of the previous year. The number of vessels built has been 219, representing a total of 169,056 tons and 15,222 nominal horse power. In 1867, when the number of vessels constructed was 242. they represented only 113,095 tons and 14,844 nominal horse-power. Of all the builders, Messrs. Napier seem to have been most highly favored with orders for ships of war. During the past year they have built and launched two monitors, De Buffel and De Tyger, for the Dutch Government, and have at present on the stocks two iron-clads, the Audacious and the Invincible, besides the Hotspur, an armor-plated ram, for the English navy. The former vessels are nearly ready for launching. Messrs. Barclay & Curle have completed as many as sixteen vessels, representing in the aggregate 16,631 tons, and consisting chiefly of sailing ships for the private trade. Messrs. Randolph & Elder have built a considerable number of steamers for the principal steamship companies. Messrs. Connell & Co., of Overnewton, have constructed several composite vessels for the China and East India trade. Among the remaining builders we may mention the well-known firm of Messrs. Caird & Co., of Greenock, who have built and "engined" six steamers (giving a total of 20,685 tons), principally for transatlantic service.


