City Affairs. -At half-past 11 o'cluck on Saturday morning, a train of coal care, while turning the curve on the Philadelphia, Wilmington, and Baltimore Railroad, at Twenty seventh s reet and Gray's Ferry road, ran off the track and demolished the locomotive and several of the cars. George

It was under-stood that this aid would be to the amount of \$2500 per round trip, or \$25,000 in all. Mr. Rodine further referred to the efforts of the Pennsylvania Relicoad Company during the list seven years to establish a steam line to Liverpeol, and intimated that there was a good prospect that said line would be soon esta-blished, and that the railroad company had amount voted to the proposed German line. #### THE FIREMEN.

New Orders by the Chief Engineer. The necessity for more stringent orders for the government of the firemen has been very apparent doring the past few mouths. On Saturday Chief Engineer Downey issued the following additional rules; -Office of the Chief Engineer, Philadelphia,

February 1, 1869, City Liall. S. W. corner Fitth and Chernut streets-To the Companies composing the Philadelphia Fire Department:following regulations, based on those issued by my predecessor, and found to be necessary by my own experience, will go into operation at all fires occurring after the lat inst. It is believed a general compliance with them will add greatly to the efficiency of companies, and rerile which, in coos of insdequate laws, have grown up in the de-partment. Any company wilfully disregarding them, after the above date, will render them

selves liable to immediate suspension. I. When a fire occurs within the bounds of a company, but in a district other than that in which it is located, the officer in command of said company shall report the arriva! of the same on the fire ground, and await instructions before going into actual service. This rule does not apply to companies located on the line of any district when the fire occurs in the district adjoining on said line.

II. Hook and ladder companies will not re-move the ladders from their trucks until ordered to do so, except in cases of unusual urgency, and before the arrival of the chief or assistant engineers.

III. No streams will be allowed to be thrown rom the street, unless when orders to do an are given by the chief or assistant engineer. IV. When a fire is extinguished, the chief or an assistant will order the nearest engines to give three signals in succession with their whistles. Thereupon the different engineers will repeat the signal, and stop their engines or detach the hose connecting therewith, render this rule effective, engineers of steamers are requested not to use the whistles of their engines on the fire ground, except for giving his signal; and they are especially warned not to imitate the signal, unle s ordered to do so by v. Hose companies and hook and ladder

companies will, immediately upon the removal of the hose or ladders from their carriages or trucks, cause their respective apparatus to be diate fire ground, so that every facility to the building on fire may be secured.

VI. Where a line of hose is in service from a plug which has been given to a steam engine company, the suction of the engine must not be attached thereto until the engine is otherwise tully ready to go into service.

VII. All companies must refrain from leaving

their respective bouses on alarms coming from a district beyond their bounds. GRORGE DOWNEY. Chief Engineer.
