SUMMARY OF RELIGIOUS NEWS.

METHODIST.

-The Rev. M. P. Gaddis, Sr., of the Cincin-nati Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, has been called by the Methodist Protestant Church in Cincinnati to serve as their pastor

until the next Conference. -The American Methodists have been doing what they can to spread their form of Chris-tianity in Germany and the Scandinavian countries. But in this work the Baptists have far exceeded them. In Germany and Switzer-land the Methodists have 5928 members, while the Baptists have 5928 members, while the Baptists have about 13,000. In Denmark, Norway, and Sweden the Methodists have 769 members, while the remarkably flourishing Baptist mission has 9139 members and 216 churches. All but one of the 199 churches in Norway and Jweden have been founded during the last fitteen years .- Independent.

CONGREGATIONAL.

-Oi the 113 new pastors recognized last year by the Congregationalists in England, but 76 were educated among them, and the remainder were supplied from other denominations, mainly

the Wesleyans. -There are now fourteen regularly installed Congregational pastors in California. This is a very fair proportion to the number of churches and ministers of the denomination, and compares favorably even with the older States of the Union.

EPISCOPAL.

- Mary Josephine Clift, recently deceased, be-queathed \$100 to the Dorcas Society of St. Faul's Episcopal Church and \$200 to the Union

Faurs Episcopal church and \$200 to the Union Benevolent Society of Philadelphia.
The Rev. Mr. Brown, rector of Trinity Church, will preach a sermon to young men to-morrow evening, in St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Thirteenth street, below Spruce.
Bichop Fastburn, of Massachusetts, has refused to sign the testimonuls of Dr. Donne.

-Bishop Fastourn, of Massachusetts, has refused to sign the testimonials of Dr. Doane, elected Bishop of Albany, New York. He has had to stand a severe catechizing from other bishops, who are far from sympathizing with him.

-Bishop Eastburn has resigned the rectorship of Trinity Church, Boston, Massachusetts. This renders vacant a second influential Episcopal pulpit in that city, the Rev. Dr. Huntington's acceptance of the bishopric of Central New York having just emptied one.

-Before receiving the signatures of some of the Episcopal bishops consenting to his conse-craticn, Dr. Doane wrote a letter to one of the leading evangelical bishops, repudiating some of the early errors of his "immature ministry,"

which he says he now neither holds nor teaches. -The Church of England holds in fee simple the right to property worth \$146,000,000 in gold, the annual income of which goes to support the clergy. And yet not more than half of the population of England and Wales is loyal to that church, and but forty per cent, in Scotland and twelve per cent. in Ireland .- Independent.

-A comparison of the statistics of the church of Rev. S. H. Tyng, Jr. (Holy Trinity, New York), with those of the doctors of divinity who condemned him, shows some suggestive facts. The united ages of the five parishes is 195 years; Mr. Tyng's is 4 years old. The five parishes have 1698 communicants; Mr. Tyng's, with its chapels, 650. The five instruct 1974 Sabbath School children; Holy Trinity instructs 1037. The five collected for benevolent objects, \$41,369; Holy Tribity raised \$35,893. The Sunday services during the year of the five parishes were 525; in Holy Tribity and its chapels -they were 624.

PRESBYTEBIAN.

-The Rev. T. J. Wilson, under appointment for Oregon, sailed on Tuesday of last week from New York for his important field, by way of

the terror of the neighborhood. In the very place where dumb idols received worship, sweet voices are now daily raised to the praise of the true God.

-The Roman Catholics are doing all they can to get control of the colored people in the South. They are to spend \$600 000 in gold this year to make proselytes. The "Sisters of Mercy" may be found all along the coast of Florida, the priests in great cities, and monks wherever they can get a hearing. Protestants should be wide awake. The poor black is cared for as well as the white. The Sisters will help the little negro girl to sew. The priest is "well mannered" to the humblest black man. Would to God that Protestant America realized the great work that is to be done among the freed-mon. There already 200 000 colored oblighter men. There are already 200,000 colored children under instruction in the South by the Roman Catholic Church.- Episcopation.


