Pollard, at Richmond, has been compelled to -Porter C. Bliss and George F. Masterman, the two members of the American Legation who were seized by Lopez just as they were about to depart with Minister Washburn from Paraguay, arrived in Washington yesterday morning. They give an account of the suder-ings endured by them while in confinement, the statement being similar to those recently pub-lished by Mr. Bliss in the New York papers. They declare that the course pursued by our late Minister, Mr. Washburn, was the only one for him to pursue with any hope of saving their lives, and they believe that has he not escaped, they would all have suffered the fate of so many of the victums of Lopez. They feel deeply grateful to General James Watson Webb, whose action they say was in such striking contrast with that of the American South Atlantic

Squadron. Letters received in Washington by the last arrival from Buenos Ayres, from a prisoner in the hands of Lopez at the time of his downfall, fully confirm all previous reports as to his crimes. He personally witnessed the execution of the brother and the brother-in-law of Lopez the Bishop of Paraguay, the Portuguese Consultible mother and wife of Colonel Martinez, and the priest Bogarell. He also saw the two sisters and the remaining brothers of Lopez shut up in

care and driven awa, and report says they bave all been ex-cuted.

Foreign Affairs.

HAVANA Feb. 25 .- The insurgen's remain in the near borhood of Cienfargos, the main body being around Villa Clars, while a targe force occup es Mayajiqua. The Government is for-warding all the available troops to Cienfuegos and other menaced towns. The journals here do not publish the report of General Cabaltero de Roda's appointment. General Paerelli, formerly of the Spanish army in Dominica, left yesterday for Cienfuegos, to take command of the regulars in that quarter. The announce-ment that Cabailero de Boda is to succeed Dulcs produces great excitement. The steamer Cricket, which left Charleston for Havana, on the 8th inst., has not arrived here, and it is presumed that she has landed a cargo of sup-plies for the insurgents somewhere on the Cuban coast.

Madrid, Feb. 25 .- In the Constituent Cortes the proceedings on the occasion of the passage of the vote of thanks to the Provisional Manistry were very interesting. The Minis ers explained their action towards the religious orders and the Church. It was stated that the Jesuit College of St. Vincent was suppressed, because its members were engaged in a con spiracy against the Government, and three of them were accomplices in the assassination of

the Governor of Burgos.

The orders directing the civil authorities to take charge of certain articles of church property were also explained and justified, on the ground that the proceedings of the clerical party demanded the interference of the Govern-ment to preserve objects of art in the churches. When the result of the division was announced, General Serrano rose to speak, and was greeted with prolonged cheers. He made a temperate, tranquillizing speech, advising the minority to pursue a policy of conciliation, in view of the firmly rooted and inexorable principles held by the majority of the Cortes. As for himself, he promised them loyalty, patriotism, and abnega-

LONDON, Feb. 25 .- In the House of Common inquiry was made as to whether the usual legal investigation before pardon had been made in the cases of the Fenian convicts recently re leased from prison. Mr. Fortescue replied that what investigation the Government had made was quite sufficient, as these cases differed from the ordinary commutation of sentences.

In reply to a question Mr. Munsell said that nego lations for a settlement between the Hudson Bay Company and the Dominion of Canada were still pending, and it was undestrable to make statements as to the prospects of building a telegraph line through the territory of the company to connect the Atlantic with the Pacific, until a complete adjustment was reached.

In reply to a question of Mr. Torrens, Mr. Otway stated that the Government had received

no authentic advices of the rejection of the Alabama Convention by the United States, nor had it any information whatever in regard to the ratification of the naturalization protocol. The Inquirer has the following news from Washington yesterday:-COLONEL M'CLURE VISITS GENERAL GRANT.

Colonel A. K. McClure to-day called upon General Grant and presented letters from Judges Williams and Agnew, of Penusylvania, stating that in consideration of the coming campaign of the Republican party in that State, they considered it of the utmost importance that the Cabinet member from Pennsylvania should be Governor Curtin, as he had the entire contidence of the Republican party of Pennsyl vania. He explained to General Grant that Judge Williams was to be the Republican can didate for Supreme Judge this fall, and he had been informed that a letter from Governor Geary, who was to be the Republican candidate for Governor, was en route to him making the same recommendation. He added that he simply desired to present to him this expression of the men whose opinions should have weight, as they asked nothing for themselves, but all for the good of the party that was to be next fall in Pernsylvania his administration party. Mr.

GENERAL GRANT REPLIED.

"Of course I am desirous that the adminis tration candidates should be elected next fall, but I cannot see why they are to make my Cabinet appointments for the next four years." Colonel McClure says he made another remark that though not directly simed at Governor Curtin, and which I shall not repeat, "entirely satisfied me that Governor Cartin would not be appointed." Colonel McClure then remarked to General Grant:-

"I accept your determination not to appoint Governor Curtip. I have merely done my duty in presenting his name to your consideration as the favorite of Pennsylvania; but now, General, after what you have said I feel at liberty, without fear of any imputation of personal bias, to urge a policy upon your administration, and I appeal to you to appoint any fair representative of the Republican party to a place in your Cabinet. I do not suggest to you Mr. Curtin or any other man, but I venture to appeal to you not to give the place to one of the class of men understood to be included in the list which, it is stated, you will make your selection from. I mean men of the type of George H. Stuart, Adolph Borie, Mr. Weish and Aubrey H. Smith. I beg you not to make your appointments from that class of men. are eminent and worthy gentlemen, but they have no sympathy whatever with the active Republicans of the State. They have no knowledge of our people, and the appointment of any one of them, and the disposal of the patronage of the State by them, would cause the utter ruin of the party in the coming canvass. This, he says, General Grant took up rather

warmly, and replied:-"I cannot see how any man could object to the appointment of such a man as George H. stuart; a man who did so much to sustain the

loyal cause during the war." Colonel McClure replied:-'I have been good many years in active politics, and I say to you frankly that I do not know him at all in political life, and I am sure that there are nve thousand of the sixty thousand Republicins of Philadelphia who know him, and they only know him as a man of blameless character, who is powerless as a man to vitalize a party. I nominate no one, but ask you not to give up one who will help to keep the State on the loyal side;" to which Colonel McClure quotes General

Grant as replying: —
"I am not the representative of a political party myself, although a party voted for me."

FIVE CABINETS EASIER THAN ONE. Among his other callers were some gentlemen from New York city, who want to press Edwards Pleapont for Attorney-General. General Grant replied:- 'You cannot say anything, gentlemen, in which I will not concur about Mr. Pierpont and I find I could make five Cabinets easier than one." This is supposed by some of these who were present to indicate that he will not call upon Mr. Pierpont, and to-night Cabinet makers are more puzzled than ever to know who are upon "the slate."

Mr. Johnson, in reply, said the object of his recent exertions had been to bring about a settlement of differences equally honorable to both nations.
This, he relieved had been accomplished by his having been met in a corresponding spirit by the Foreign Secretaries With regard to free trade, he remarked that when the United States were brought to see that it gave this country an advantage over them, they would not be slow to adept it. In the atternoon Mr. Johnson was presented in the City Hall with an address referring in complimentary terms to his diplomatic services. In reply he sail he had from the be-ginning of his mission availed himself of every suitable occasion to cultivate the friendship of her Majesty's subjects, and to remind them of the duty of entertaining friendly feelings for the United States. In the evening he was prethe United States. In the evening he was presented with an address at a great public meeting held in the City Hall, and presided over by Mr. Dalglish. In reply to the address Mr. Johnson said that his Government always favored cheaper oceanic postage, and a few days since had instructed him to use his best efforts to get the British Government to adopt lower 12 cm.
