Pike, Starkweather, Haight, Stewart and Archer, of the majority, report that the evidence entirely fails to sustain any charge of fraud or collusion on the part of either Engineer Zeller, who bought the tools, or John Roach & Son, of the Morgan Iron Works, of New York, who sold them; that all the parties concerned acted to periect good faith, and that the investigation was set on foot only by Bement & Dougherty, Philadelphia manufacturers, who were disappointed because a New York instead of a Philadelphia firm furnished the tools; but who fail to sustain their charges by suy reliable evidence. The minority, Messrs. W. D. Kelley, Stevens and Ferry, report that in their opinion the purchase of the tools was unwise and inju-dictions, and that it would have been cheaper to have made the purshases of the Philadelphia manufacturers. The prices of the tools in vesti gated amount to about \$32 000. All the committee exonerate Messrs. Roach & Son from any charge of traud.
