HAVANA, Feb. 27.--(Special to the New York HavaNA, Feb. 27.--(Special to the New York Heraid.)--The night parols of the city have been discontinued. More troops are going to the in-terior. Intelligence from Nuevitas to Thursday last state that on Sunday night, February 21, the doors of all the residences in that city occupied by Cubans were marked by a black cross or placarded with the words "The time for elemency is ended. Vergance." Great excitement was eaused, and the strennous efforts of a few prominent Spaniards alone prevented an outbreak. A foraging expedi-tion from the besieged garrison of Puerto Principe a few days since burned the Scaldovas estate. On a few days since burned the Scaldovas estate. On their return they were attacked by Cuban forces, and were compelled to retreat to Puerto Principe with a loss of forty killed and a large number wounded. Four thousand refugees from the country are reported to be at Gibara. There was great dearth of provisions, and an epidemic was feared.

HAVANA, Feb. 28 .- Rumors are in circulation that expeditions from the American shore, in aid of the rebels, have landed near Remedios and Guldrellas. Fifteen hundred soldiers have left for the central department. Some Cubans declare their belief that as soon as Grant is inaugurated he will recognize the belligerent rights of the revolutionary government in Cuba. Cuban accounts contradict the government dispatches reporting a triumphant advance from La Guanaga.

ARMY ORDERS.

Disposel of the Troops among the Southern and Western States.

THE FOLLOWING is a full copy of General Orders No. 6, recently issued, the promulgation of which has occasioned great interest in army circles:

HEAD OCCASIONCE Great Interest in Army circles: HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY, ADJUTANT GEN-ELAL'S OFFICE, February 18.—General Orders, No. 6.—The following changes and transfers will be made in the army as soon as the necessary arrange-ments can be made and proper transportation pro-vided. The regiments to go to the extreme north will be mayed as soon as paylingtion opens:

will be moved as soon as navigation opens: Regiments of Cavalry.—First. The commanding general, Division of the Pacific, will make such

general, Division of the Pacific, will make such change in the station of the companies of this regi-ment, and at such times as in his judgment the health of those serving in southern latitudes and the good of the service may demand. Regiments of artillery—Second. The following light batteries will proceed, without delay, to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and report to the command-ing general of the Department of the Missouri, who will select a suitable post at which these and Light Battery B, 4th artillery, shall bestationed. In order Battery B, 4th artillery, shall be stationed. In ord to carry out effectually the system of instruction i light artillery practice, a field officer of artiller will hereafter be designated to command the pos will hereafter be designated to command the post. The four batteries of the 1st artillery; Light Bat-tery K, 2d artillery; Light Battery A, 3d artillery; Light Battery C. Battery K, 1st artillery, will turn over its horses to the Quartermaster's Depart-partment to be sold, and will take the battery to Fort Leavenworth. The quartermaster will trans-port the horses of Battery G, 4th artillery, from Detroit to Fort Leavenworth for this battery, and purchase such new horses as may be necessary to Detroit to Fort Leavenworth for this outlery, and purchase such new horses as may be necessary to make up its complement. Battery A, 2d artillery, will turn over its battery to the ordnance office at Benicia, and its horses to the quartermaster, to be sold, and will proceed, via the isthmus of Panama, to Fort Leavenworth. The Ordnance Department will supply a new battery, and the Quartermaster's Department new horses for this battery at Fort Leavenworth.

Leavenworth. Battery C, 3d artillery, will march across the country to its new station. The following batteries will be dismounted, and until further orders there will be dismounted, and until further orders there will be but one mounted battery to each regiment of artillery. Battery I, 1st artillery, to turn over its battery to the commanding officer at Browns-ville. Texas, and its horses to the Quartermaster's Department to be sold, and then proceed to take post at Fort Schuyler, New York. Battery A, 2d artillery, to turn over its horses to the Quartermas-ter's Department to be sold, and retain charge of its battery, unless directed by the Department Commander to turn them in at the Benicla Ar-senal. Battery E, 3d artillery, to turn over its bat-tery to the ordnance officer at the Augusta Arsenal, Georgia, and its horses to the Quartermaster's De-Georgia, and its horses to the Quartermaster's De-partment to be sold, and then proceed to take post at Barraneas, Florida. Battery G, 4th artillery, to retain charge of its battery and turn over its horses to the Quartermaster, who will cause them to be carefully inspected, sell such as are condemned, and transport the remainder to Fort Leavenworth, to be turned over to battery K, 1st artillery. Bat-tery G, 5th artillery, to remove its battery to the ordnance office at Baton Rouge Arsenal, and its horses to the Quartermaster's Department to be add, and then proceed to take post at Fort Adams. Georgia, and its horses to the Quartermaster's Dehorses to the Quarternizer's Department to be sold, and then proceed to take post at Fort Adams, Newport, R. I. Regiments of Infantry—Fourth. The enlisted men, except surplus non-commissioned officers and musicians of the regicommissioned officers and musicians of the regi-ments relieved, will be transferred to the regiment relieving them: 2d regiment to proceed to the post occupied by the 13th infantry, in Montana terri-tory; 7th regiment to proceed to the posts occupied by the 31st infantry, in Dakota territory; 11th re-giment to proceed to the posts occupied by the 15th infantry, in Texas; 16th regiment to proceed to the posts occupied by the 10th infantry, department of Dakota; 24th regiment to proceed to the posts oc-cupied by the 17th infantry, in Texas; 33d regiment to proceed to the posts occupied by the 26th in-fantry, in Texas; 34th regiment to proceed to the posts occupied by the 12d infantry in Dakota. Sixth. On being relieved, as above directed, the officers and surplus men of the following regiment not transferred, will proceed without delay to the posts designated, and there report to the superin-tendent of the general recruiting service, through posts designated, and there report to the superin-tendent of the general recruiting service, through whom they will receive further orders: To New-port harracks, Kentucky, the 10th, 13th, 23d and 3ist infantry; to Fort Columbus, New York harbor, 15th, 17th and 26th infantry. FROM CUBA.

Progress of the Insurrection-Reported And to the Insurgents by Americans-Important News.

MAVANA, Feb. 27 .- It is reported that the insurgents are lingering in the vicinity of Santiago de Cuba, and have again cut the aqueduct, causing much inconvenience to citizens. Special information has been received that General Lesca, strongly reinforced, is pushing his way from La Guanaja. The insurgents were stationed in force on the road near Magarabomba, and it was expected the troops would soon attack them. General Puello has arrived at Cienfuegos with reinforcements.

The troops here will be divided into three de tachments, one under Puello will go to Santo Espiritu; one under Letona to Villa Clara, and the remaining division, under Paez, will march to Sierra Morena and Maragua. An engagement took place between the Spanish troops and the insurgents at Colonia de St. Domingo, in the province of Sagua La Grande. Many were killed on both sides, but the result of the battle is not known. Reports from Cuban sources say a fight occurred between the rebel forces under Quesada and the army of General Lesia, on the road from Granada. and assert that the government troops were routed Advices from Santiago de Cuba to Sunday last have been received. The cholera was decreasing.

Three steamers left this port to-day crowded with Cuban refugees for the United States.

The brig Franklin Spofford, of Bucksport, from Nuevitas for Cardenas, has stranded off the point Matermillo. At the last accounts the United States steamer Gettysburg was trying to save her, but with doubtful success.

The schooner Nelly True, from Maine for Car denas, was wrecked off Martus. The captain and crew were saved.

St. Domingo advices to February 20 state that the negotiation for a loan from British capitalists is a failure, the security offered not being satisfactory.

The question of annexation to the United States is exciting considerable interest. Baez has instructed General Falbers to confer with the United States government on the policy of creating a free neutral centre of commerce in St. Domingo. The tobacco crop shows an increase.
