MADRID, March 5.—In reply to the inquiry of Castellar, in the Cortes, vesterday, Sagosta, Minister of the Interior, said the Government had prepared, and intended to issue, a procla-mation of amnesty for all political offenses, but the promulgation was postponed on account of the recent conspiracies.

HAVANA, March 4. -The Treasury Department advertises for proposals from stip owners to furnish transportation for three hundred and fifteen political prisoners, who are to be taken to the penal station at Fernando Po. There is a profound feeling of sorrow among the friends and relatives of the prisoners, many of whom belong to the first families of the island. But the measure is excusable, when it is considered that their transportation will save them from dangers like those by which they were threat-ened on Sunday last, when the volunteers demanded their death. General Duice has ordered their removal in consequence of the intense pressure which is brought to bear upon him by ultra Spaniards. An Overlooked Statute.

It is currently reported this evening that Mr. Stewart, of New York, is incligible to the office of Secretary of the Treasury, on account of an old statute, which is still in force, and which seems to have been entirely overlooked. AFFAIRS IN GEORGIA.

Meeting of the Republican Convention-Unnnimous Endorsement of President Grant's Inaugural, Etc.

ATLANTA, March 5 .- The Republican Convention was neld here to-day. One hundred and four counties were represented by two hundred and thirty-eight delegates—two hundred and cre whites and thirty-seven colored. All the counties in the White Belt were repre-

The Convention was called to order by Foster Blodgett, Chairman of the State Committee. Judge Dunning, of Atlanta, was elected tempotars chairman, and Benjamin Conty, President of the State Senate, was chosen permanent President of the Convention. The Convention

was very harmonious.

A preamble and resolutions were adopted setting forth the failure to comply with the Reconstruction acts in the organization of the Legislature, requesting Congress to reoganize the Legislature, resear the colored members, and establish a loyal government. The convention unanimously endorsed the course of Governor Bullock and the inaugural address of President Giant, and appointed a committee to proceed

One resolution denounces the Legislature for the expulsion of the colored members as a violation of the Constitution of the State and the principle of the Reconstruction laws; recommends the reassembling of the Constitutional Convention: propose the expulsion of certain parties engaged in the Rebellion, who, they claim, are ineligible under the fourteenth umendment, and supply their places with the rejected colored members; and also to provide for the entranchisement of the colored race. A resolution denouncing General Meade's administration was tabled.
