

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. A new ferry boat, which is to run between this city and Camden, was launched on Tuesday at Wilmington Del.

The steambot John Blyester commenced her trips yesterday between this city and Wilmington. The steamer M. M. Felton will commence her regular route on Monday.

Jeremiah Hogan, who resided at Ninth and Green streets, died yesterday at his residence, at the advanced age of 102 years. He was noted for his temperance principles, and in the enjoyment of good health up to within a few days.

The new Belmont Grammar School building, at Forty-first street and Oregon avenue, was dedicated yesterday with appropriate ceremonies.

Frank Conner, whose residence is at No. 563 East Lehigh avenue, was found yesterday afternoon on the Reading Railroad after a train of cars had passed over him. He was run over by the Episcopal Hospital, where he died soon after.

Jacob Waters, 38 years old, a German, while walking yesterday on the track of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was struck by a train which knocked him down and injured him very badly. He was taken to the Pennsylvania Hospital. The residence of the injured man is not known.

The missionary anniversary of St. George's M. E. Church, was celebrated yesterday evening in the church, Fourth street, below New York, in the presence of a large audience. The pulpit was very handsomely decorated for the occasion, and the exercises were highly interesting.

HARRISBURG. The Majority Report of the Committee on Federal Relations—the Constitutional Amendment. Yesterday, in the Senate, the Committee on Federal Relations submitted a report on the resolution ratifying the fifteenth constitutional amendment. From the majority report, signed by Messrs. Lowry, Graham, and Ormsbee, we take the following:

Why should not Pennsylvania give its colored citizens the right of vote? In the States lately in rebellion, slavery has not only been abolished, but by the people themselves as expressed in their State Constitutions, the rights of suffrage have been restored to the black man under no restrictions which do not apply equally to the white. The Constitution of the three yet remaining will guarantee the same rights to the colored citizen.
