## PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENTS.

What is Said of Them in Washington, The New York Times' Washington corres-

The New Orleans appointments are the subject of much discussion. The selection of Sidney A. Stockdale as Collector of Internal Revenue for the First District of Louisiana gives unauipondent says: mous satisfaction. He was strongly indorsed by the Chamber of Commerce and by the mer-chants, as well as by his political friends. This selection illustrates forcibly General Grant's knowledge of men. Mr. Stockdale first came to his notice as a private in Governor Oglesby's regiment of Illinois infantry. He was under his eye from that time until the war closed, serving at last as Provost Marshal on the General's staff. Thence he went to New Orleans as Deputy Collector of Customs under Collector (now Senator) Keilogg. He is a young man of unquestioned ability and integrity, and will give satisfaction, beyond doubt. The appointment of James F. Casey as Col-lector of the Port is not so heartily commended by the Louisiana people here, thouga his ab lity, integrity, and titness are fully conce led. He is a brother in law of the President, and the pro-priety of the selection is the ouly objection seriously urged again-t him. This 01 185 way when it is remembered that the President becomes directly responsible for the management of the Castom-house, and there can be no doubt that he means to hold Mr. Casey to that responsibility. Personally the new collector is man of fine presence and address, affable and courteous, and even if judged solely from his appearance, it is evident the President has made no mistake in the man.

The nomination of General Longstreet as Surveyor of the Port is received with a diver-sity of sentiment. Many of the Republicans are pleased with it, and it was endorsed by the New Orleans Republican editors here. Some of the ex-Union soldiers denounce it in severe terms, but everybody concedes General Longstreet's ability and integrity, and of its saturary and reassuring effect upon the mass of the Southern people there can be no doubt. There will prohably be considerable discussion on his condr mation, and much curiosity is munifested to see the effect produced upon the country by this experiment.
