THAYER VS. GREENBANK.

Report of the Committee of the Legislainre on the Contest.

The report of the committee on the Tayer-Greenbank case, after setting forth in detail the object for which the committee was appointed says:-It will not appear surprising that the committee do not agree with either the counsel for the petitioner or respondent, the first claiming a clear majority of 212 votes for Mr. Thayer, and the latter, one of whom claims a majority of 205, and another 243, as equally the clear

of 205, and another 243, as equally the clear majority for Mr. Greenbank. Without going into details, your committee has not been able to find any such majority for either of the candidates; and if the determina-tion of the question rested alone on the returns of the several divisions, corrected by all the papers which threw any light upon them, and of the illegal votes proved on the one side or the other, and the count of the ballots, your committee would have to report that neither of the candidates was entitled to the office; for the carclessness, to use no harsher expression, in most of the papers in making up the return is most unaccountable to your committee, and shows strong evidence, if not of frand, at least an attempt to commit it. But your committee is of the opinion that much stronger and greater reasons exist, why the case should be becided upon other grounds, from all the testimony given.

The contestant and respondent ask your com mitice to reject the votes of some twenty three Recent divisions from the return. Evidence, however, was given only to affect the Second and Tenth divisions of the First ward, Seventh of the Third, Sixth and Eighth of the Fourth, Sixth and Seventh of the Seventeenth, Tenth of the Ninetcenth, and Fourth of the Twentyfifth.

Amongst the internal evidence presented of the fraudulent mode of carrying on the election in some of these divisions, is the proof that the officers received more votes in a given time than it was possible to do in the strict per-formance of their duties. The purpose of the officers in many cases seemed only to be to receive the votes and put them in the boxes! without regard to whether the person was en-titled to vote or not, and in most of the divisions there was a very large number of voters not on the list.

With regard to the Tenth of the Nineteenth, the committee says:-"Without deciding who were the proper officers at this election division, it is sufficient for the committee to know, from the testimony in this case, that from the conduct of those holding the election, and of their friends on the outside, the voters in this division did not and could not exercise their rights, and that no fair election was held." The report concludes as follows: -

Your committee have reluctantly come to the conclusion, though going a step further in the Second and Tenth divisions of the First than has ever been doue before, that it is their imperative duty, from all the testimony given in this case, to reject the entire vote of the divi-sions above referred to. If elections are to be "free and equal," and citizens are desirons of having their votes made effectual, the only way is to hold the citizen and the election officers to a strict performance of their several duties. Mis-takes and irregularities will even then happen. As such, they can be corrected, but when there is an almost total disregard of the election laws by the officers, and a denial on the part of one class of voters against their opponents, the time has come to say that, if such are the facts esta-blished, their ballots shall not count.

The commander of the Andalusia, in a com munication to the Captain-General, giving at account of the capture of the brig, aftirms that he acted carefully, in accordance with interna-tional law. The value of the cargo of the Mary Lowell is estimated at \$200,000, consisting of cancon, small arms, ammunition, and other war material. The expedition was commanded by Costitious.

The Spanish war steamer Gandiana arrived to day from Nassau. She left another Spanish war yessel to watch the waters of Nassau.

A detachment of troops under General Esca-

lante has gone to Gienfuegos. Additional troops have been sent to Cardenas,

Sagua, and Remedios. A meeting of planters was held at the palace to night, at the request of General Dulce, to discuss and plan a system of rural police, to be established throughout the island for the protection of plantations. News has been received of a heavy battle be

tween the troops and the insurgents in the Central Department, on the road from Remedios to Moran. The Spanish forces are commanded by General Phello. No complete report of the battle has been made, and the result is not known, but the Spaniards claim that 800 rebels were killed.

PARIS, March 24. - At the last meeting of the Council of Ministers, the Emperor introduced a project of a law abolishing the whole system of workmen's registers. He expressed his satis faction with the results obtained by the pro-gressive measures of the past few years. After reviewing former legislation enlarging the rights and liberties of the workingmen of France, he said he believed that the law he now proposed would place them in a proper position, tend to disarm hatred, and cause force to give way to right. The Emperor's pro-plet was adopted by the Council, and the law will be submitted to the Corps Legislatif at an early day.

The Aborigines.

The Pennsylvania delegation, consisting of George H. Stuart, William Welsh, and others, d upon the President yesterday, at noon. and had an interview relative to the Indian policy of the Government. The delegation was formally introduced to the President by Mr. Buart, after which Mr. Welsh stated the object of the visit. He submitted a proposition that the President should appoint a commission of five or seven gentlemen, to give their services gratuitonsly to the Government, and who shall act with the Secretary of the Interior in the management of Indian affairs. The President and Secretary of the Interior,

who were present, expressed themselves satisfied with the proposition, and the President intimated that he proposed to make a radical change in the Indian policy of the Government. After the various members of the committee had expressed their views, Mr. Stuart closed by saying that a portion of the delegation was composed of members of the Society of Friends; he had lived among them for upwards of thirty years, and he would say that if their advice were taken in the management of Indian affairs, there would be fewer wats and less complaint of dishonesty among indian agents. After the delegation left he White House they proceeded
