NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. -The sixteenth auniversary of the Bedford Street Mission occurred last evening, and was celebrated by a meeting of the contributors at the Mission House, Bedford street, above Sixth. The annual report was read, by which it was shown that during the year 712 persons had received medical assistance; 924 food and clothing; and 76 had signed the temperance pleage. The Mission has a fine bathing house, to which 1346 permits were given for cold baths, and 1810 warm baths, making a total of 3158. During the year five children were piaced in comfortable homes. There is attached to the Mission a chapel in which services are held on Sundays and during the week: also, spartments for the weekday intant school, numbering 95 children, and adults 109. The Sunday School numbers 105 scholars and 25 teachers. There are also 50 pupils in the Bible classes. These are instructed by 10 teachers. A Board of Managers was elected for the ensuing year. The Treasurer reported the receipts at \$2700.

-The tifteenth annual report of Mr. William J. Mullen, Prison agent, just issued, states that 36,333 arrests were made by the police during the past year, showing a decrease, as compared with 1867, of 6281. The number of commitments to the County Prison was 15,620. The Agent examined into 3700 cases of which number 1603 were released, all of which were court cases. The release of these persons, it is stated, has been a saving of \$18,261, of which amount \$11,621 would have been required for ignoring their cases, and \$6639 for their maintenance. Of the 36,333 arrests during the past year, there were but 5553 cases acted upon by the grand inries: of this number 2361 cases were ignored and 2992 true bills found. Of the whole number but 550 were found guilty. The expenses of the Criminal Court amount to \$56,213 42; of the Prison, \$104,621 63 and of the Police, \$844,484 24. The number of persons discharged from the County Prison during the year was as follows:— By the Inspectors, 7007, and by the courts and magistrates, 7121.
