Local Affairs.

-The Coroner was sent for yesterday to hold an inquest on the body of John Divine, who was killed by failing down stairs at No. 620 Swapson street.

Yesterday, at half-past 1 P. M., the funeral of Joseph W. Smith the person found dead on Wednesday evening last, took place from Gir and Half. A crowd of several hundred people assembled in the vicinity of the half, independent of the long procession of societies forming the inneral escort. In the latter were noticed many females. During the morning the body, enclosed in a resewood casket, lay in the hall, where it was visited by many at the deceased's friends, and also a number of strangers.

A meeting of the friends of the New Hope and Philadelphia Railroad was neld a few days since, and it was resolved that the amount of stock reported subscribed should locate the road. It the upper route had the largest number of shares, then the road should be built on the route surveyed from Forks of the Neshamony via Hatborough and Willow Grove, to Edge Hill Station, N. P. R. R. If the lower or through route had the majority, then it would be built on the route from Forks of the Neshamony, via Huntingdon Valley, to Philadelphia, both parties agreeing to the survey from the Delaware river to the Forks of the Nesnamony. The subscriptions in favor of the upper route amounted to \$80,000 at the time of the meeting, only \$111,000 being necessary to commence to build the road.

by the Coroner's jury in relation to the mysterious death of Joseph W. Smith, janitor of Girard Hall, no developments have been made calculated to throw light upon the affair. It was ascertained that the pistol which was found at the side of the deceased was purchased by him, a few days previous to the killing, at a shop in the lower part of the city. He had first bought a Derringer, but concluded afterwards to exchange it for a small-sized four-berrelled Sharp's pistol. We learn that some important witnesses have been withheld for a future examination before the Coroner, who will show that Smith had reason to lear an attack, and that he had the pistol in his pocket on the alternoon of the murder. The last theory in respect to the use of the pistol is, that after Smith had been tied, he succeeded in freeing his hands sufficiently to get the pistol from his pocket, and that then it was snatched from him and discharged at his head. On Saturday, while washing the top of a pedestal in the hall where the deceased met his death, large spots of blood were discovered on the pedestal.
