THE HILL MURDER.

Statement of George S. Twitchell, Jr. Yesterday afternoon, two friends, one a witness for the defense on the trial, visited Twitchell in his cell at the County Prison, and had a conversation with him in regard to his "confession." The following is the conversation,

as detailed by one of the parties:-Question. Is the statement made on Saturday of your own composition, and without any influence whatever? Answer. It was my own entirely; and on Saturday I asked Mr. Perkins to be present, along with Mr. Bringhurst, at the

ading of it.
Q. Did you on any occasion ever before know Mrs. Twitchell to leave her bed after retiring?
A. Yes; I have known Mrs. Twitchell frequently to leave the room, and also have known her to be gone sometimes for over an hour, and converse with Mrs. Hill. But on this evening in question, I fell asleep on the lounge, and cannot say whether she left the room or not.

Q. How do you account for the blood on your shirt and person? A. All I can say to that is, that in lifting up the body to throw it out of the window, I caught hold of the head and shoulders, the heaviest portion, and my wife the feet.

Q. Was Mrs. Hill dead when you threw her out of the window? A. As far as I am able to judge, Mrs. Hill was dead when I lifted up the body, for I heard no groans and could not detect breathing. Q. Where was Mrs. Twitchell when she called

you? A. Sae was in the entry, at the end of the staircase leading up into our room.
Q. Can you account for the poker in the yard?
A. I cannot. I knew nothing of a poker until

after our arrest. Q. How about the ashes on the window-sill? A. I was smoking after tea, as it was my usual custom, and I presume I left them there.

Twitchell here added: I did not entertain the slightest idea that my statement would after my situation as far as the law went, but made it to have entire peace with my God, and did not think it would be published until after my execution. My reasons for not stating it sooner are simply these—that I fully expected my wife to come forward and state all, and not leave me to perform the unpleasant duty: but her absenting herself from me, and her actions so unnatural to me, and in such a position, have compelled me to come forward and state all know, which I did on Saturday. I would state, also, gentlemen, that if these statements can be said by my wife to want foundation, and are incorrect, let her come forward and deny them.

Cuba.

It is reported at the capital to-day that a son and daughter of Mr. Casanova, now in prison in Cuba, appeared before the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, and asked the committee to recommend such action on the part of Congress as will more effectually protect the rights of American citizens on that island. The committee appeared indisposed to do anything in the matter, whereupon the parties repaired to the White House to have an interview with the President. The result thereof has not transpired at this writing. It is also reported that the Executive has ordered two monitors to be made ready for sea, and the presumption is that they are destined for the Cuban coast. Another rumor is, that the order recently made, assigning the 12th Infantry to California. has been countermanded. All this, if true, looks belligerent, and the general opinion outside official circles is, that Grant is only waiting a favorable opportunity to send such a force to Cuba as will give such moral support to the insurrectionists as to secure their success. An evening paper says:—"The Government has received information from New Orleans that an expedition is acout to sail for Cuba to join the insurrectionary army. 
