





FROM VIRGINIA.

The Oystermen Oppose the Collection of the State Revenue-Action of General Webb. Special Despatch to The Evening Telegraph.

RICHMOND, Va., April 8.-For a long time it has been impossible to collect the taxes levied by the State against the oystermen who infest the waters of Virginia. The amount uncollected amounts to thou-sands of dollars. Whenever the civil officers attempt to collect the tax the oystermen show light and drive them off.
