The buildings were occupied as dwellings by George Blake, Timothy Creegan, and Jeremiah Leary, one of them being vacant. The flames originated on the roof of the house of Mr. Blake, from a defect in the chimney, and spread so rapidly that the occupants had barely time to save their effects, which they secured in a damaged condition. The buildings belonged to Rev. James Kelly. He valued them at \$2500. They were partly insured in the Fire Association. The firemen were compelled



MADRID, April 14 .- It is reported that Gene ral Prim will go out to Cuba as Captain-General, accompanied by large reinforcements of troops for the suppression of the insurrection.

PARIS, April 14.—The Presse newspaper says the rejection of the Alabama Claims Treaty by the United States Senate will be the cause of great prejudice to the United States in Europe. LONDON, April 14.—Among the races at New Market to-day were those for the column stakes and New Market handlesp. The former was won by the filly Martinique, and the latter by Mr. Saville's filly Skirmisher.

LONDON, April 14 .- In the House of Commonsthe Married Women's Property bill, introduced by Right Hon. Russell Gwiney, was read a second time.

HAVANA, April 14.—Volunteers are organizing in the interior. The Voz de Cuba warns the public against over-confidence in the termina-tion of the insurrection. The Diario says Spanish war steamers are watching two expeditions which are expected from the United States. Casanova has not yet been released. A decree anthorizes the raising of one thousand additional guardias to protect the plantations of western planters, who are to pay them.

The latest advices from Puerto Principe report dearth of food. A convoy had arrived from Santa Cruz, under guard of nine hundred troops. They encountered two thousand insurgents in an intrenched position on the road, and, after a desperate fight, dislodged them. The troops admit the loss of six killed and twenty wounded. The insurgents in the vicinity are numerous. They have beef and vegetables in plenty, but are without bread and powder.

Santiago advices of the 9th report a fight on the Isabel estate. The loss was insignificant. Twelve hundred troops had arrived from Batafano.

Advices from Sancta Spiritus, of the 9th. state that General Puello is here and acting as Governor. He has ordered the country stores moved to the nearest town.

Sagua dates of the 10th give information that the Governor had a fight with Liebano. The losses were heavy on both sides.

A despatch from Trinidad, on the 10th, says that thirty respectable citizens had been arrested and imprisoned.

Napoleon Arango and other insurgent chiefare heading a party in the Central Department in opposition to General Quesada, who, however, has the largest number of adherents A consin of General Cespedes has been killed near Manzanillo.

Advices from St. Thomas report the arrival there of one of the Peruvian monitors.

HARRISBURG.

The Trouble About the General Appropriation and Tax Bills.

HARRISBURG, April 14 .- There is prospect of trouble in the Legislature. Both houses have agreed to adjourn at Friday noon, and yet the Senate defeated the General Appropriation bill, this afternoon, by a large vote of both Repub-licans and Democrats. The Democrats voted solid against it, and were joined by seven Republicans.

The seven dissenting Republicans give variety of reasons for their course, the principal of which appears to be that the bill conflicts in some of its appropriations with the economical policy which the Senate agreed to adopt early in the session. Among the objectionable appro-



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
