much below Offenbach's works in musical merit as Herve's L' Œit Creve is above them. According to the statement on the programme of the evening, Fleur de The achieved an extraordinary success in Europe, enjoying two long runs in Paris, besides creating an "unprecedented furore" in the principal capitals of Northern Europe where it was represented. The Parisians must certainly have been pining for a novelty, or else were able attractive feature in the work which are invisible to us. The libretto of Fleur de The is well written, and the subject is a good one for the purpose of a musical burlesque, The plot, such as it is, turns upon the misadventure of "Pinsonnet," the cook of a French man-of-war lying off Pekin, who, with his wife "Cesarine," carries on quite a profitable trade in a cabaret which they have established on shore. Unfortunately for "Pinsonnet" his place is visited by "Fleur de The," the daughter of "Tien-Tien," a mandarin and chief of the Pekin police, who, being desirous of seeing for herself what the outside barbarians were like, eluded the vigilance of her guardians, and started on a little expedition in search of knowledge. The sudden entrance of the mandarin forces her to hide in an adjoining apartment, where she is discovered by "Cesarine," whose jealous wrath is aroused, and the girl is forced to face her indignant parent. "Tien-Tien" declares] that, according to the Chinese law, a stranger who beholds the face of an unmarried woman must either accept her as his wife or be impaled, and "Pinsonnet" is accordingly seized and carried off to his palace. The rest of the piece is taken up with the complicationcaused by the unlucky affair, and by the jealousy of "Cesarine," who succeeds in substituting herself in disguise for "Fleur de The" at the marriage cere mony, while the Chinese girl is made happy in the arms of her original lover, "Kaolin," the captain of the Tigers, whose matrimonial prospects were nipped in the bud by the accident which gave him the

When the trick played by "Cosarine" is discovered the mandarin proposes to carry out the law by im paling "Pinsonnet," preparatory to which he and his followers get intoxicated on champagne which "Cesarine" furnishes them, and the opera concludes with the only really good thing in it-a lively champagne cherus, in the midst of which the French sailors rush in and rescue their countryman.

To an audience who understood the language this piece might be amusing, as a mere burlesque, but to those who consider the music as the most important part of the performance, there is nothing to specially commend it. Most of the airs are quite pretty and that is the best that can be said of them, and as we remarked above, the best thing in it is the jolly bacchanalian chorus with which it concludes.

Mad'lle Desclauzas acted and sang the part of "Cesarine" excellently, and M. Beckers as "Tien-Tien" and M. Francis as "Kaolin" performed in first-rate burlesque style. M. Carrier, who does not appear to be much of an actor, sang well enough as "Pinsonnet," but otherwise he fell far below any of the artists who have appeared here in leading roles, and Mad'ile Rizarelli, who appeared as "Fleur de The," added nothing to the strength of the cast. The costumes were very handsome, but, with the exception of the first scene, the usual Academy scenery was used, and as this was entirely inappropriate, the performance was not as effective as it would have been if properly mounted.
