The protest, however, was of no effect. He

also gives an account of the murder of the prisoners by the volunteers at Calbarien.

Three affidavits were made against the parties implicated in the brig C. Colson fraud, but all of them have absconded. The cargo has been dis-

charged by the United States Marshal, and only two hundred bales of trashy cotton found to represent eight hundred and eighty-nine bales, for which bills of lading had been signed. The steamer Nina Simmes, from Bayou Sara
