BEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs.

Mrs. Boucher, residing at No. 4 Rulston street, committed suicide last evening by taking oplum. Deceased was sixty years of age. The Coroner was notified to hold an inquest. —The Trustees of the Philadelphia Gas Works

der, aged 2 years, was run over at Hancock and Jefferson streets by a passenger car, and killed. The wheels passed over the head, causing almost instant death. The body was removed to the residence of the parents, rear of No. 175 Jeffer-son street, and the Coroner notified to hold an incomet inquest.

-Ground has been broken at the southwest corner of Third and Arch streets for the commencement of the new church intended for the congregation of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church. The building will be of the Henderson marble, in the Gothic style of architecture. Twenty four persons were recently added to this church onfirmation.

-The Pennsylvania Scamen's Friend Society during the past year has placed 125 sea libraries in 11 different languages on board of vessels leaving the port of Philadelphia; given 915 sopies of the Word of God to seamen, and dis-tributed 40,000 pages of tracts among the sailors along our wharves. Within a few years it has placed 700 sea libraries of 50 or 60 yours each n the vessels of different nationalities, as they

ch the vessels of unreferre international and the left this port. —William Bassford, mate of the American barque Brilliant, had a hearing before United States Commissioner Henry Phillips, Jr., yester-day, on the charge of maliciously assaulting Na-thaniel Tare, steward of the vessel. Last, when testified that on the 25th of August last, when between Key West and Havana, the mate firs used abusive language to him, and then struck him violently over the eye with an instrument o some kind, causing a severe wound, and render ing him unable to attend to duty for four days The captain of the vessel testified that the steward was insolent, refused to obey orders, and that the mate struck him with the hand, and not with any instrument. The testimony of the steward was corroborated by two or three of the crew, except that none of them saw the mate have an instrument of any kind. The Commis-

sioner reserved his decision. —The formal opening of the Rooms of the Tobacco Trade of Philadelphia took place yes-terday afternoon, at the rooms, No. 129 North Front street. The lower room is about 45 feet square, and is used as a daily exchange. The to-bacco merchants meet there daily at 12½ o'clock in the morning. The upper room is fitted up for the storage of articles pertaining to the interests of the trade. Both apartments are neatly fur-nished with chairs, desks, and engravings.

The President of the Association, David C. McCammon, on taking the chair yesterday, said that in the early part of June, 1868, a few gen-tlemen connected with the tobacco trade met together, feeling the necessity and state of the times demanded some kind of an organization for mutual protection, and resolved to form a Tobacco Association. Some sixty firms, representing one hundred and twenty-three members. were enrolled, and are now members of the Tobacco Board of Trade. Its history has been little known, owing to the circumstance of its having but recently acquired a local position, and is only familiar to those who have been more immediately connected with it and taken an active part in its deliberations, but felt in the halls of legislation, where its members have had a partial hearing, imparting such information as to justify modification in existing laws which were detrimental to the great interests of the trade.
