SENATOR SPRAGUE. Or the unhappy consequences of putting a small man in a large place, Senator Sprague is a frightful example. His mental calibre is not great, but when he exercised the functions of the gubernatorial office of Rhode Island, where the members of the Assembly always go to their own homes to dine, the distance from the Capitol thereto being so insignificant, Senator Sprague's deficiencies were not discovered. When he arose in the morning he had only to put aside the curtains of his dressing-room windows to enable him to take in at a glance the entire country over which he presided. He had therefore not much to govern, and it is not too much to say that he governed that little indifferently well. It was the old story over again, and ending with the same moral of the frog who wanted to be an ox, or of the gentleman from Tennessee who, thinking that as he had made a respectable tailor and alderman, he would also make not a bad President. In this way the misguided people of Rhode Island sent the printer of calicoes "warranted to wash to the United States Senate. They fancied be would measurably represent the interests of the little State over the destinies of which they once allowed him to preside as Governor; and now they see their mistake, and with sackcloth about their loins and ashes on their heads ther bewail the error of their selection of Senator, for they find that Mr. Sprague, instead of attending to the interests of his handful of constituents, is maligning. in not choice terms, the noblest and worthiest of their citizens: that he has brought upon himself the deserved contempt of the nation by the coarseness, incoherency, and indecency of his assaults upon private character; that he is shielding himself behind the privileges of the Senatorship to make charges and publish libels upon better men than himself, which he would not dare to make or utter outside of his office: that he has set Sprague up as the one honest man in his whole State, and the only reliable manufacturer of callcoes that will not run in washing; that, instead of legislating diligently. intelligently, and with dignity upon the affairs of the nation, he has simply dragged before the people his own petty spites, wrongs, and troubles, and advertised them freely in the Congression

There is, unfortunately for the nation, a rival manufactory of printed cottons in little Rhode Island, which is carried on by a certain Messrs. Brown & Ives. These are as Mordecal sitting at his gate, and by the use of all the undignized. indecent, and unsenatorial epithets known to this jobber in politics and calico, he attempts to drive his Mordecai away. But in his rage and weakness, like a man fighting after his sight has gone, he strikes madly and blindly at everybody and everything. He hits foul, weak blows at his constituents, at the Senate, at lawyers, at the President, at generals, at his colleague, at the public morals, and most blindly and viruleatly at Brown & Ives, those rival makers of cotton prints. If anything consistent can possibly be evolved out of the depths and intricacles of his speeches, it is only that Sprague's is the only true, warranted-to-wash calico; that great is Sprague and Sprague is his prophet.

Has this unfortunate person no friends? Will nobody step forward to save him from himself Cannot the beautiful and gifted Mrs. Sprague, who in New York attempted to carry the Democratic Convention of July for her father, and who came near doing it, too, cannot she take this irrepressible Senator from Rhode Island in hand, and see to it that he washes no more of his solled linea in the nation's sight? It was the oldfashioned notion of our fathers-no later ago than that-to attach some honor to the Senatorial office; and though they sometimes filled it with weak or incompetent men, they very seldom indeed allowed it to be occuped by one who disgraced the nation by the foulness of his slanders and the coarseness of his personal venem. In fact, only a generation or two before our fathers. time, there were ducking stools up there in New England for the punishment of public scolds and termagents, which, if they existed now, would be bad for the Senator from Rhode Island when he returned home.

Not only the State which sends her representative to the Senate, but the country itself, has a right to expect such a one shall at the very least regard the common decencies of life in his official speech and conduct; that he shall speak and act so as not to bring contempt upon the body of which he is a member, or to bring into disrepute and cast ridicule upon the whole nation. The people care nothing about Senator Sprague's private quarrels, and they are as capable of deciding whether he is the only honest man in the Senate as he is, and will determine the question quite independently of anything he may say. But they will not believe in his honesty the sooner because he alleges all the rest are "thieves" or "puppy-dogs," and such like epithets. His calicoes will, however, still be bought just as freely as Brown & Ives, provided they will wash, and are sold as cheap; and we respectfully suggest to this dealer in cottons, that neither the Senate chamber or the Congressional Globe is the proper places in which to advertise his own goods or to cast discredit upon his rivals.

ENGLAND AND CUBA. A CABLE despatch published this morning gives us a rumor that the British Government is about to adopt a decisive line of policy with regard to Cuba, by reognizing the insurgents as belligerent, and assisting them in gaining their Independence. This report is in all probability true so far as the concession of belligerent rights is concerned, although we doubt whether any assistance will be openly rendered to the Cuban revolutionists, but if there is anything to be gained by it we may expect to see a new fleet of Alabamas proceeding from British ports to prey upon Spanish commerce. The reasons for the adoption of this line of policy by the British Government are sufficiently evident. The popular sympathy which exists in this country for the Cubans is well known, and the English wish, if possible, to be beforehand with us in securing a foothold on the island of Cuba, and, if possible, preventing it from falling into our hands. That they have any idea of obtaining possession of the island themselves

we do not believe, as the same line of policy | which forced the French to abandon Mexico and put an end to the Empire of Maximilian would be insisted upon with even greater energy in this case. The English, however, if they do not obtain Cuba for themselves, wish, by any means, to prevent us from getting it. Under these circumstances, the United States Government should be on the alort to defeat any British movement of the kind suggested, by promptly acceding belligerent rights to the Cuban patriots, and taking the necessary steps for the extension of American influence on the island. The Cubans already have the sympathies and moral support of a very large majority of the people of the United States, and there is a prevalent feeling that the time has nearly arrived for us to add Cuba to the States of the Union. At all events, it is our plain duty to defeat the machinations of the English Gov erment, and to prevent it from obtaining any claim whatever to dictate as to the future of

The Cuban Insurrection-It is Dying Out-Aid Asked from the United States.

The Cuban Insurrection-How Long They Cas Hold Out.

Washington, April 26.—It has come to the knowledge of the Government that unless material aid is rendered to the Cuban insurgents, they will be compelled to succumb to the power of the Spanish authorities within sixty days at the outside. This fact is scknowledged by the warmest friends of the insurgents, and it is known to the British, French, and Spanish Ministers here. No action will be taken by our Government at present that will strengthen the insurgents in the slightest degree.
