### NEWS SUNIMARY.

#### City Affairs.

-The Republican City Executive Committee gives notice of a meeting of Republicans next Tuesday, at the various places of holding elec-Tuesday, at the various places of holding elec-tions, for the purpose of correcting the registry for the delegate election. On Tuesday week the **Republicans** will meet in their respective divisions to elect delegates to a Senatorial and Represen-tative Convention, the object being to elect dele-gates to the State Convention, which meets next June. This is a subject of importance to the Republican party, and the members thereof will doubtless take a deep interest therein. —Last evening, about 11 o'clock, fire was dis-covered in the northern portion of the large rink, Twenty-first and Race streets. Owing to the combastible nature of the interfor of the building, the flames quickly spread throughout

building, the flames quickly spread throughout the structure, and in a few minutes the fire was seen issuing from every portion. The wind from the north assisted the spread of the flames, and in less than half an hour after the fire was and in less than half an hour inter the free was first discovered the immense arched roof fell in with a crash. The building was creeted during last summer, and designed as a Skating Rink. It had a front of 150 feet on Race street, and ex-tended to Cherry, a distance of 300 feet. The structure was of frame work, covered with corrugated sheets of thin iron, and during the pro-gress of the fire these fell one by one to the ground, leaving the shell of the building standing for some time after the roof had fallen in, Although intended as a Skating Rink, it was used for that purpose but a few times during the winter. A velocipede school was opened in it about three months ago, and it was still used for that purpose when it was destroyed. The principal entertainment given in the building was that on Monday evening, under the building was that on Monday evening, under the auspices of the Odd Fellows. The building was owned by a stock company, and cost about \$90,000, on which there is an insurance of \$40,000. The in-tense heat placed the surrounding property in great jeopardy, but, owing to the exertions of the firemen, no damage was done beyond the destruction of the Rink. The Swedenborgian church on Cherry street was at one time in great danger, but the several streams of water on it saved it.

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

Bayamo, Cuba:--Count Valmaseda, the commander of the Spa-nish forces in the Eastern Department, has issued a proclamation, whereof the following are issued a proclamation, whereof the following are the chief features: —First. Every native, male over fifteen years of age, found away from his residence without sufficient cause, will be exe-cuted. Second Every uninhabited dwelling and every inhabited dwelling where a white flag is undisplayed, will be reduced to ashes. Third. All women away from their homses will come to Bayamo or Jiguari, or they will be brought by force. The proclamation is dated at Bayamo, April 4. April 4.

HAVANA, April 28, via Key West, April 29.-The second battalion of volunteers, commanded by Colonel Zeulata, and forming the garrison of Fort Cabana, in the harbor of Havana, having refused to obey an order for the release of a prisoner, General Dulee and staff were obliged to proceed to the fort in full uniform. To effect a change in their disposition, the Captain-General made an address to the volunteers, when they suffered the prisoner to depart under an escort

of Government troops. The revolution in the Eastern Department is gaining strength. The Spanish troops in that portion of the Island are suffering greatly from sickness. The Cubans are besieging and con-stantly harassing them, and the capture of various convoys causes a scarcity of supplies and ammunition in the Spanish ranks.

#### Foreign Affairs.

VIENNA, April 20.-The law declaring Prague in a state of seige has been annulled, and placards have been posted in various parts of the city, requesting the inhabitants to avoid any further disturbances.

MADRID, April 29 .- The majority in the Cortes urge a prompt decision either for the Duke de Montpensier or Prince of the Asturias as king. or the declaration of a republic.

The Republicans are about to start a national petition in favor of a republic.

GENEVA, April 29.—It is rumored to-day that the Swiss government has requisted Joseph Mazzini to leave the country. He lives at Lu-gano, near the Italian border, and his connection with the recent conspiracy at Florence and Milan has probably led the Italian government to make such request of Switzerland.

LONDON, April 29.-Captain Carleton was shot at Athlone yesterday.



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
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
