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NEWS SUMMARY.

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Local News.

-A meeting of sympathizers with the Cuban revolutionists was held last evening, in the Academy of Music. The house was crowded, and among the audience were many ladies. The stage was decorated with the Cuban flag, and filled with the officers of the meeting. The audience was very enthusiastic, applauding every reference to and mention of Cuba. Theodore

Cuyler, Esq., presided. John Price Wetherill introduced the President, Theodore Cuyler, and the latter spoke briefly in favor of the object of the meeting. Addresses were also made in sympathy with Cuba by Gene-ral Joshua T. Owen, Hon, William D. Kelley, Major William McWilliams, and others. During the evening an authem was sung by Mr. Hart-30,000 man of the Mænnerchor.

John Goforth, Esq., read resolutions, which were adopted, declaring "that Cuba, of right, should be free and independent; that as a people we will labor to encourage a generous sympathy for the noble patriots of that island in their struggle, and to procure for them every form of practical aid and comfort which may be possible for us to bestow without violating existing neutrality laws; that the successive triumphs of the patriots since October last, and their present self-reliant attitude, combined with the significant resolutions of the House of Repre-sentatives, ought to impart a fresh impulse to our sympathy; that, having reason to believe that the President of the United States has a warm sympathy with the patriot cause, we hope that he will be guided more by the instincts and principles of American politics than by the precedents and the timid politics than by the precedents and the timid policy of the State Department of late years; that should the continued success of its patriot army be such as would justify the President in recognizing the absolute independence of the new republic, we sincerely trust that he will call Congress together with alacrity, and urge them to anthorize him to welcome Cuba into the family of nations; and that to give practical effect to the foregoing resolutions and concert measures to promote the Cuban cause, a committee of thirteen be appointed by the chairman of this meeting, who shall have these duties in their charge, and are hereby empowered and lustructed to sit en permanence, or until the independence of Cuba is a positive fact."

Foreign Affairs. LONDON, April 80.-The speech of the Mayor of Cork at the recent banquet in that city was the subject of long debates in both houses of Parliament this evening, the attention of mem-bers being called especially to the Mayor's lan-guage respecting O'Farrell, who attempted to assassinate Prince Alfred in Australia, as well as to his reference to the Prince himself. Mr. Jarvis upbraided the Government with being the indirect cause of the present state of Ireland.

Mr. Bright thought the present condition of affairs in Ireland to be no cause for panic, but urged that both parties should strive to remedy land grievance at this session of Parliament For himself, he would not remain on the Trea-sury beach if he did not feel that he was honestly and energetically advocating measures which would effect great salutary changes in Ireland.

The settlement of the Church question will not stay present outrages in that portion of the United Kingdom, but it is the first example that any Parliament has ever given that it was will-ing to do justice to Ireland, and is an earnest of that intention.

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
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
